

The film will be accompanied by Dr. Vance Reese on the College's renowned Kirkpatrick-Coleman organ. This epic silent movie is a retelling of Victor Hugo's 1831 novel of the same name.

Those unfamiliar with the silent film genre will appreciate these facts about the film: the sets covered nineteen acres of land at Universal Pictures. The film took six months to shoot, and 2,000 extras were employed for the climactic scene. Lon Chaney, playing the hunchback Quasimodo, went on to play the role of the Phantom of the Opera two years later.

Frances Ross Hall may be gone, but its legend remains

Savannah Hill once held a house known as the majestic Francis Ross Hall, a place that had held the WLEE department, been a president's house, used as storage, and was known for its hauntings and legends surrounding it. Francis Ross Hall was eventually condemned and stood atop its lonely hill, rotting away. Over the 2021 summer, Francis Ross Hall burned down.

Legend has it that the hall was built on top of a Native American burial ground that was dug up without remorse to accommodate the need for a hospital during the Civil War. The basement was said to be used as a morgue, insinuating the bodies of those lost may not have been buried far from the building.

Though the building is not old enough for this legend to hold truth, stories were still passed down about the supposed spirits that remained.

One more famous story depicts an injured soldier falling in love with his nurse, and as they plan to marry, the building caught fire and the nurse was trapped inside. The soldier ran back inside to save his love and failed, causing both to burn in the flames and roam the halls in search of one another.

Another spirit that roamed the halls was known as "Clanker". They were believed to stay in the boiler room and on bitterly cold nights, they would

beat the radiator pipes endlessly.

Mrs. Francis Ross, the wife of the treasurer that raised the funds to purchase Ross Hall for Brevard College, was also stated to visit and attempt to take care of those occupying the buildings at the time.

Neva Corbin, in the 1972 *Pertelote*, tells of a ghost that sat on the front porch of Ross Hall. Neva said, "he watches the campus lights, the gentle darkness of the mountains; and the threads the particulars of each human destiny at Brevard College back into the whole of existence."

There are tales of a translucent-looking young man carrying books, rushing somewhere and slamming doors, as well as objects being moved like alarm clocks and books.

Whatever spirits that did reside in Ross Hall, legend or truth, may never be known again. Ross Hall became too expensive to repair, so it was burned down.

Next time you're walking past Savannah Hill, watch for a moment. Burning down a building does not get rid of a ghost.

The Pink Lady of Grove Park Inn

The Grove Park Inn is one of the most well-known and popular hotels in Asheville. The hotel first opened its doors in 1913. It was founded by Edwin Wiley Grove after he had made a large fortune from selling, "Grove's Tasteless Chill Tonic." It was so popular because it was a Malaria preventative that masked the taste of quinine, a bitter ingredient.

Grove moved to Asheville on doctor's orders; the city and surrounding areas were popular health getaways in the period. He immediately fell in love with the area and decided to put down permanent roots. The inn was built to be equivalent to the grandest hotels in the area.

The pink lady's story begins in the 1920's at a ball held in the inn. The ball was filled with high-class individuals and debutantes. According to legend, she was attending the ball in a beautiful pink ball gown. She wasn't alone; she was instead staying with her lover, a married man.

Brevard College needs to be held accountable

Many students have faced several issues with the administration at Brevard College. Earlier this semester, a large number of students said “holds” had been placed on their accounts, despite owing nothing to the college.

The college’s financial office has reportedly been passive-aggressive to students who have tried to get the holds removed. Some students have seen their unexplained holds stay on their accounts for months, barring any potential opportunity for them to transfer elsewhere.

Some students have also noticed their balances owed fluctuating wildly, with no explanation. This issue was especially prominent in the weeks leading up to the beginning of the fall semester.

One former student said, “My balance went up by \$10,000 and I have been calling for days but no one will get back to me.” Eventually, the student was forced to skip a semester due to the balance being too high for their family to manage.

One angry parent also said, “I called multiple

times a day for days and left several voicemails trying to pay the outstanding balance.” That was in July. It is now October and the parent has still heard nothing.

Freshmen have also faced several issues this semester, such as lack of parking, faulty air conditioning and bug issues that have been prominent for years.

Green Residence Hall is also posing huge issues for students. One male student has suffered from heat rash, there is repeated black mold growth and several of his items becoming covered in mildew after leaving them in his closets. He said this about the situation: “I’ve had a heat rash for weeks, I had to buy three fans just to be able to sleep through the night.”

Other residents in the building are having issues with mold as well, but the administration so far has been completely silent on any solutions.

The administration should not avoid addressing such pressing matters. The college must be held accountable for these issues.

Canady Picks Up Second National Award of 2021, Sixth-Straight Tornado Honored by D3football.com

BREVARD, N.C. – For the second time this season, senior linebacker Steffon Canady was honored by D3football.com, earning a selection onto its Team of the Week following Canady's record-shattering performance on Saturday in Brevard's 7-3 win over Southern Virginia.

The nod marks the sixth consecutive week that a Brevard College Tornado has earned a spot on the national team of the week, with Canady receiving his second honor while teammates Geoff Banning, Wyatt Lankford, Jaden O'Leary, and Joc Pledger also earning national plaudits this season.

Canady, a Glendale, Arizona native and an Exercise Science major at Brevard, accumulated eight tackles and tied his own record with four quarterback sacks for a total loss of 30 yards. The senior also logged a forced fumble and a pass breakup to his ledger.

Canady currently leads the conference with 9 ½ sacks this season and has accumulated a program record of 22 ½ sacks over the course of three seasons at Brevard. Canady set the program single-season mark back in 2019 with 11 ½ sacks in the season.

Over the course of BC's last three contests, Canady has surged with 7 ½ quarterback sacks

to pace a Tornado defense that has allowed just 20 points and five points-per-game over the course of its four-game win streak. Brevard's defense is tied-for-first in all of NCAA Division III with 32 total sacks, while leading the entire

country with 78 tackles-for-loss.

Canady and the rest of the Tornados prepare for a Saturday, October 30 road matchup in Fayetteville, North Carolina against Methodist University, kicking off at 1 p.m.
