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Dollar General takes over campus bookstore

After the contract with the previous bookstore vendor expired earlier this semester, Brevard College has announced they have reached an agreement for a new vendor to manage the oncampus bookstore: Dollar General.

Kings Creek Bookstore officially became a Dollar General store earlier today when the large yellow sign for the ubiquitous chain of variety stores was installed outside Coltrane. Almost immediately, the store began to run out of toilet paper and chocolate bars.

Initially, the college sought more traditional vendors to run the campus bookstore, including Amazon, Barnes & Noble, and a newer company called Textbooks R Us. In the end, all turned down BC's offer when it became clear that at no point had any Brevard students ever

actually purchased books from the on-campus bookstore.

Into the mix came Dollar General, who as part of the deal made with the college promised to drop the sale of textbooks and focus instead on discount pet food, automotive products, cleaning products and a vast assortment of snack foods.

While not directly involved in the decision to contract with Dollar General, BC President David Joyce nevertheless praised the decision to put a Dollar General on campus. "If there's one thing we don't have enough of in Transylvania County, it's Dollar Generals," he said. "The addition of the BC Dollar General on our campus will save us from having to ever leave campus to buy Slim Jims, Hostess Twinkies and Snoballs or Nacho Cheese Doritos."

The decision to install a Dollar General on the Brevard College campus is not without some

controversy. Already, a number of those who last year protested a new Dollar General on Greenville Highway, less than five miles from one in Brevard and another on the same stretch of road, have expressed some concerns that a college campus may not be the ideal location for the discount merchandiser. "No Dollar in the Holler" signs in Brevard near campus have been spotted with Sharpie edits to now read "No DG at BC" and "No Dollar, Alma Mater."

Despite the smattering of opposition, the deal to open the new BC Dollar General is already moving forward, which will include future stores. As part of the deal with the college, the retailer also secured the right to open at least three more Dollar General stores on campus in the next six months.

BC cafeteria to go partially vegan

After some long consideration by the Brevard College administration, the school has come to the decision that Meyers Dining Hall will be a partially functioning vegan cafeteria by next semester, fall 2021. The unanimous decision came after students have been complaining for months about not receiving enough nutritious food from the cafeteria.

This may come as a surprise to meat-loving students. There is hope for these students, however, who do like to eat meat. The cafeteria will be offering meat to those students who wish to eat it, but primarily the cafeteria will be serving vegan and vegetarian food to its student body. Meat will now be upon request for non-vegetarian and non-vegan students.

COVID-19 willing, the salad bar will be back in the fall semester as well. New toppings and other food items will be available as well to students, such as tofu, dairy-free cheese, a variety of nuts, quinoa, cranberries, kale, beans and dairy-free dressings as well.

The sandwich station will start offering meat substitutes as well for students. Some wellknown brands that students will recognize that will be offered are Tofurkey, Light Life, Gardein, Morning Star and Boca Burger.

Students also complained about the variety of different meals each week, saying that the cafeteria makes the same meals in a boring rotation that never changes. The administration took this into consideration, and took a vote on three new meals that will be introduced into the caferteria's rotation. These three new meals that will be offered starting in fall 2021 will be vegan lasagna, butternut squash soup and vegan burrito bowls, or burritos.

The cafeteria will also be providing oat milk, almond milk, coconut milk and soy milk as dairy alternatives for coffee and cereal. A smoothie bar is going to be established near the main assembly line as another healthy option. Chia seeds, coconut flakes, dark chocolate, strawberries, peaches, mangoes, pineapples, blueberries, raspberries, apples, pineapple, bananas, vegan yogurt, dairy-free milks and

peanut butter will be offered as possible combinations for smoothies.

As a way of cutting down on unhealthy foods, the cafeteria will also now be implementing air fryers into their cooking routine. Gluten-free bread will also be available to students who have a sensitivity to gluten or for those who just wish to eat it.
