NC Mountain State Fair returns

The North Carolina Mountain State Fair is back at 1301 Fanning Bridge Rd, Fletcher, NC, with a bunch of rides, events and animals to see and experience, running from Sept. 10 to Sept. 19.

Adult admission is \$10, but different days allow for different entry bonuses. Sept. 15, five Laura Lynn brand canned foods can be brought for free entry, Sept. 16 has unlimited rides for \$20 from 4 p.m. to 11 p.m., Sept. 17 has unlimited

rides all day for \$25 and Sept. 18 gives away a free lottery ticket with every adult entry ticket. Tickets can be purchased online and in person.

The rides with the longest rides were some of the more seemingly thrilling ones, like the Cyclops and the Pirate. If you are looking for a more peaceful ride with a shorter line, the Skyline takes you over the entire fairground.

At the back end of the grounds, there are a few animals to pet, but most animals are displayed, ranging from pigs to goats to long horned cows, and many more.

The most popular competitions (and the ones with the highest awards) are cooking, gospel singing, livestock, clogging, a pageant and ice cream eating, along with other crafts based competitions, too.

The North Carolina Mountain State Fair opened its doors in 1994. After last year's fair was cancelled due to COVID-19, this year was its twenty-seventh year running. The North Carolina Mountain State Fair has worked

BC post office gets a facelift

Brevard College's post office is a very traveled destination. Recently, the post office received a major makeover.

The most notable change about the post office is that it changed entrances. To go to the post office before, students would come by entering and exiting over by the bookstore, but now, students can enter through Tornado Alley. It is one of the few offices in Tornado Alley that did not change its location.

The post office got a little smarter this year. The installation of new smart lockers has been put to the right of the door to the post office. During the summer, 49 lockers were installed. The smart lockers are currently grey colored, but soon they will receive a fresh wrap. The lockers are also supposed to get a Brevard College logo to them.

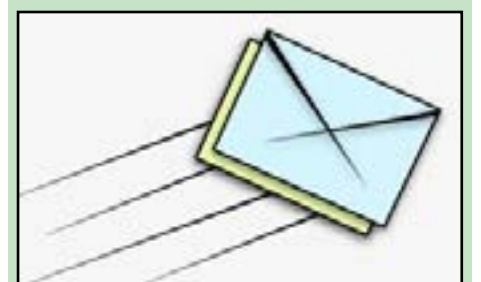
Students receive an email from parcel pending that will inform them when a box is waiting for them in a locker. Attached to the email is a barcode that can be scanned to open the locker that contains that student's mail.

The new lockers help with less person to person contact. The lockers are restocked through the day which decreases person to person even more. The lockers can be accessed everyday which means packages can now be picked up on weekends.

The new lockers do not fully take away the experience of telling the workstudy student running the office the student's name to receive their packages. The post office tries to use the lockers as much as they can, but there are not enough lockers to quite get everything. It is unknown about more lockers coming in the future.

One of the factors that led to deciding to make the change was the increased volume of packages due to textbooks now coming from eCampus. Also, the new changes go well with less person to person contact with COVID-19.

Although the old lockers were unique, it is nice to see the Brevard College post office stepping into the twenty-first century.

Britney Spears' father stepping down as conservator

“I just want my life back. It’s been 13 years and it’s enough.”

Britney Spears' father filed to end the conservatorship that has ruled her life for 13 years; Jamie Spears filed this petition on Sept. 7 in Los Angeles Superior Court.

The overseer of this case, Judge Brenda Penny, will have to approve. However, this petition states, “If Ms. Spears wants to terminate the conservatorship and believes that she can handle her own life, Mr. Spears believes that she should get that chance.”

A petition for Jamie Spears removal was filed July 26, but this is to be heard in court Sept. 29. Spears has repeatedly said there is no justification for his removal. This has made him a target of anger for those who believe Britney Spears should have the right to her children, medical choices, finances and life back.

Jamie Spears has been accused of mismanaging his daughter's money and affairs and using the conservatorship for his own gain by Britney's attorney, Mathew Rosengart. He filed for an emergency hearing for the removal of Jamie Spears in June, but Rosengart was denied by the judge who said it could be heard in the due court of Sept.

Penny's allowing Britney Spears to hire her own attorney shows the court's trust in her to make major decisions pertaining to her future. Sept. 7's filing notes also say that she has “shown a level of independence.” Judge Penny has not shown an interest in ending the conservatorship before, but now is presented with a clearer case.

Fans have also pushed for Spears'

conservatorship to be halted and for Jamie Spears to be removed. Many believed Britney's Instagram posts were cries for help and started a hashtag called Free Britney, as well as appearing outside of her court hearings to protest. Miley Cyrus and Justin Timberlake have also joined this outcry, especially after her speeches to the court in June and July.

Britney said in her June 23 speech that helped spark this movement, “I just want my life back. It's been 13 years and it's enough. It's been a long time since I've owned my money. And it's my wish and my dream for all of this to end without being tested.”

If any further progress is made with ending the conservatorship, it will be known Sept. 29.

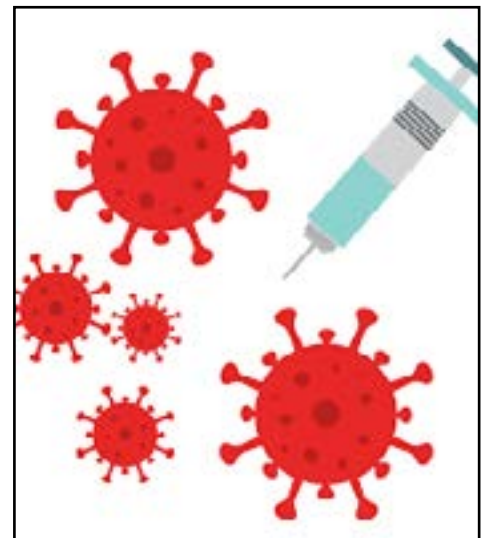
Former New York Governor, Andrew Cuomo, made a statement saying that all healthcare workers must have at least one dose of the vaccine by Sept. 27. There has been a significant number of healthcare workers that resigned because of these requirements. Chief Executive Gerald Cayer stated at a press conference that they will not be canceling or removing the maternity department, but he feels it is unsafe to keep it running right now

without staff. Cayer has put a temporary pause on this program until further notice.

The vaccination rate in the Lewis County Health System is 73 percent in healthcare workers. 464 employees have received that vaccination, while 165 employees have yet to receive it. Cayer states that he believes the healthcare world has been put on strict deadlines and there is not a lot of time to complete everything that is required.

They cannot wait until the last minute to get everyone vaccinated. They need to start now.

Apprentice prevails in overtime thriller, 34-27

BREVARD, N.C. – A spirited comeback attempt by the Brevard College football team (0-2), including 10 unanswered points in the final 4:09 of regulation, came up just short as the Apprentice School Builders (1-0) scored a touchdown and stopped the BC offense in overtime to claim a 34-27 victory on Saturday at Ives-Lemel Family Field.

Senior defensive lineman Jerome Bass sparked the comeback attempt with a 63-yard interception return for a touchdown, capping off an impressive day for the Red Springs, North Carolina native who racked up nine tackles and three tackles-for-loss. Senior kicker Stamati Damalos enjoyed a career day with a career-long 45-yard field goal make while capping off the Tornado comeback effort with a 41-yard field goal with 32 seconds left in regulation that tied the score at 27 points.

Brevard's spirited come-from-behind effort was stifled in overtime, as Apprentice's Ricardo Corpus hauled in a 20-yard touchdown pass from Mason Tatum before stopping the Tornado offense on four consecutive plays to secure the win.

Tyler Harrison totaled a team-best 11 tackles, while veteran linebackers Toby Naylor and Steffon Canady added eight and seven tackles, respectively. Naylor forced an Apprentice fumble on a sack, while Steffon Canady recovered a fumble and had a team-best four quarterback hurries. Junior defensive back Joc Pledger recovered a fumble and had five tackles.

Sophomore quarterback Eli Carr went 20-for-33 passing while throwing for 187 yards and a pair of early touchdown passes. Brandon Norris had a team-high 64 yards receiving with a touchdown, while Zachary Orr hauled in his first career touchdown reception – a 13-yard connection with Carr.

Both sides had long interception returns for touchdowns, with Apprentice's Xavien Hunter taking a pick 90 yards in the second quarter to the end zone. The Builders were 7-of-17 on third down compared to BC's 3-of-14 mark. Apprentice slightly outgained BC, 226-197 in total offense, while the Tornado defense forced three turnovers to Apprentice's one. However,

penalties cost both teams, with Brevard's 14 infractions costing 144 yards and Apprentice's nine penalties surrendering 71 yards of field position.

Apprentice won the toss and deferred, giving the Tornados the ball first. A holding call put the hosts back 10 yards before the Builders' defense forced a punt. After getting the ball at midfield, Apprentice put together a four-play, 54-yard scoring drive highlighted by a Leland Girdy 42-yard touchdown reception that gave the visitors the early 7-0 lead.

Brevard turned right around and put an eight-play, 75-yard drive together that was capped off with Norris' 19-yard touchdown drive. BC's defense then forced a fumble as Naylor stripped Tatum while Canady recovered the loose ball, setting up the Tornado offense inside the red zone. Carr found Orr on a swing pass to give Brevard the lead, 14-7.

BC's defense forced an Apprentice punt just before the end of the first quarter, but a six-play, 38-yard drive was stalled when a Carr pass was picked by Hunter and returned 90 yards, tying the contest up at 14. Damalos' career-long 45-yard field goal make handed the Tornados a three-point lead at the intermission, 17-14.

Apprentice opened the second half with an eight-play, 35-yard drive that ended with a 46-yard field goal from Jeremiah Morgan that tied the contest at 17. Morgan again connected with 2:14 left in the third quarter, drilling a 47-yarder that put the Builders back on top, 20-17.

After the fourth-consecutive Tornado drive was stalled, Apprentice strung together a pivotal eight-play, 37-yard drive ended in Tatum connecting with Ricardo Corpus for a nine-yard touchdown strike, extending the Builders' lead to a 10-point, 27-17 advantage.

With time winding down on the ensuing Apprentice possession, Bass picked off a Tatum pass and dashed 60-plus yards to pay-dirt, bringing the hosts within three points, 27-24.

BC's defense came up big, forcing a three-and-out on Apprentice's next possession. Carr and the offense drove down to the Apprentice 24-yard-line before Damalos split the uprights with a game-tying 41-yard field goal to bring the contest to a 27-27 stalemate, forcing overtime.

Tatum came through for the Builders on

third down, finding Corpus wide open in the middle of the end zone for the go-ahead score that proved the game-winner. On Brevard's overtime possession, Dalton Cole was stood up on fourth-and-three by a host of Apprentice defenders, giving the Builders the overtime road win.

The Tornados return to action next Saturday, September 18 for a 12 p.m. kickoff at NC Wesleyan College in Rocky Mount, North Carolina – BC's first USA South Conference contest of the Fall 2021 season.

Tornados continue successful start to fall mountain bike season in Bristol

BRISTOL, Tenn. – Following an exceptional return to intercollegiate racing as host of the Brevard College/Ride Kanuga Mountain Bike Race Weekend, the BC Cycling team continued its early season success with a strong weekend of results at the ACCC/SECCC dual conference race weekend hosted by King University on Saturday and Sunday in Bristol, Tennessee.

At the weekend event in Tennessee that did not include races in the Downhill categories, Brevard earned a total of four race wins, 15 podiums and 34 top-ten finishes. Through this season's first two race weekends, the Tornados have accumulated a whopping 13 race wins, 36 podium finishes and 92 top-ten results.

Sophomore Erica Leonard earned two race wins and three total podiums at the event to lead the Tornados. Leonard won Saturday's Women's A Dual Slalom and Sunday's Women's A Cross Country to go along with a second-place finish in the Women's A Short Track Cross Country race held Saturday. Through the first two races this season, the native of Barrie, Ontario has totaled four race wins and six podium finishes. Last week at the Brevard College/Ride Kanuga Mountain Bike Race Weekend, Leonard earned wins in Women's A Downhill and Women's A Dual Slalom as well as a third-place podium finish in Women's A Short Track Cross Country.

Also on the women's side in Bristol, senior Madison Altman earned two podiums with second-place finishes in both Women's B Cross Country and Women's B Short Track Cross Country. Senior Hannah Dickson (8th) and sophomore Nina Machnowski (10th) added two more top-ten finishes for the Tornados in Women's A Cross Country. Dickson also placed sixth in Women's A Short Track Cross Country.

On the men's side, the Tornados proved to be the dominant team in Saturday's Men's A Short Track Cross Country with a 1-2 finish along with five top-ten's. Senior Tyler Orschel edged fellow senior Tyler Clark to take the race win and add two more podiums to the storied collegiate careers of the two Canadian national team members. Freshmen Cole Punchard and Owen Clark, who also both raced for Team Canada at this year's UCI Mountain Bike World Championships, finished 5-6. BC Freshman Philip Ford finished 10th in the Men's A Short Track race that featured 41 total riders.

BC's dominant day continued with a podium sweep in Men's A Dual Slalom with Owen Clark, Tyler Clark and Cole Punchard finishing first through third with Simon Donnaway placing fourth to complete the 1-2-3-4 Tornado sweep. Brevard sophomore Cameron Mader placed ninth as the Tornados took 50 percent of the top-10 in the category. The race win for Owen Clark in the Dual Slalom marked the first win as a collegiate for the freshman from King City, Ontario.

In Men's B Dual Slalom, Ford made his way to the podium with a third-place finish to go along with a fourth-place result by senior Finn Cullen.

Sunday's Men's A Cross Country saw a third-place podium finish for Orschel to go along with top-ten's by Owen Clark (4th), Tyler Miranda (5th) and Ford (7th). In Men's B Cross Country, the Tornados earned two podiums as Mader and Dylan Richardson placed 2-3 to go along with a 6-7-8 finish by Watt Hackney, McCaskill and McDonald.

BC sophomore Daniel Zuniga earned two podiums with a second-place finish in Saturday's Men's C Short Track, a third-place podium in Dual Slalom, and a fourth-place result in Sunday's Men's C Cross Country to help add even further to the Tornados' success. McDonald (5th) and McCaskill (6th) added two more top-ten's in Men's C Dual Slalom.

After a weekend off, next up for the Brevard College Cycling team is another SECCC race weekend on September 25-26 at Lindsey Wilson College in Kentucky.

The ten-time national champion Brevard College Cycling program features varsity programs in the disciplines of Mountain Bike, Cyclocross, Road, and Gravel Racing.
