The BC Class of 2023

Largest class in Brevard College history receive diplomas in 170th commencement

A lot happened on Saturday, May 6.

In London, England, Charles III was formally crowned king in Westminster Abbey, the first new monarch in the United Kingdom in 70 years.

In Louisville, Kentucky, Mage won the 149th Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs after the favored horse, Forte, was scratched because of a foot injury.

And in Brevard, North Carolina, Brevard College celebrated the largest graduating class in the college's 170-year history.

In all, 165 graduates—seven of them master's students—earned degrees in the annual commencement exercises. The number included fall 2022

graduates as well as spring and summer candidates.

While most were physically present to walk across the stage on Saturday morning to receive their diplomas, several of this year's graduates (mainly baseball team members who were competing in post-season play that Saturday) wore their regalia and received their honors at a separate, smaller ceremony that took place on Monday, May 8.

For Saturday's crowd, however, it was a day for graduates to celebrate their achievement with their families, friends, and faculty and staff.

“Graduates, I commend you. You have worked hard to be here today,” BC President Bradley J Andrews said. “Your dedication to your studies, your passion for academics, athletics and the liberal arts have led you to this day.”

Festivities began with a traditional Baccalaureate & Hooding Ceremony on Friday afternoon, May 5, in the Porter Center for the Performing Arts. The graduation ceremony on Saturday morning took place on the Ives-Lemel Family Field. Both events were live-streamed, allowing family members and friends to enjoy the events from afar. President Andrews welcomed everyone and then the campus minister, The Rev. Dr. Sharad H. Creasman, gave an invocation to open the proceedings. Heath Weldon, chair of the Board of Trustees and a

1975 BC graduate, offered greetings from the Board, followed by the announcement of honors and awards by Dr. Jennifer Frick-Ruppert, Vice President of Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty.

Three students received Presidential Awards for Distinction: Rosa Eberhardt, Wesley Fletcher and Sarah Hajkowski. The award recognizes graduates who demonstrate remarkable leadership, service and academic achievement.

Alydia Monahan was honored with the C. Edward and Brona N. Roy Good Citizenship Award for exhibiting a record of moral character, citizenship, leadership and a positive influence on campus.

Jessica Garland, Christian Humphries and Gabriella Herbertz each earned the Presidential Award for Scholarship, which honors the graduating seniors with at least 62 hours of coursework at Brevard College, with the highest academic rank, based on the cumulative grade

President Andrews also presented the inaugural Brevard College Lifetime Leadership Award to Ray Henley, who has been an advocate for the College for many years.

Unlike many colleges who invite a well-known guest to speak at the ceremony, Brevard College engages its students in the process and encourages personal growth by choosing two outstanding seniors to speak at Commencement. Graduating seniors Gabriella Galvan and Scott Douglas delivered thoughtful and heartfelt commencement speeches, encouraging their fellow graduates to unapologetically be themselves and to never give up.

“The 2023 graduating class joins a group of esteemed alumni of Brevard College who all have one thing in common, the basis of Brevard College’s motto: learn in order to serve,” said President Andrews.

Following the awards and speeches, the names of 136 Brevard College graduates were announced to cross the stage and receive their diplomas from President Andrews. More than 40 of the newly-minted graduates hail from Western North Carolina, while the rest traveled from 14 states and four foreign countries to make Brevard their home.

To conclude the ceremony, President Andrews offered a charge to the graduating class, followed by the traditional Brevard College hymn “Guarded Well By Mountains” led by Sarah Hajkowski. Graduates and faculty processed in and out to bagpipe music, a tradition at College.

“Keep in touch with your mentors as you navigate your next steps and beyond. We are here to support you and we will always be eager to acknowledge your achievements,” Andrews said. “Starting with your achievement today: I celebrate each of you as you graduate from Brevard College.”





Environmental Lit students create ebooks

Students in ENG 217, Environmental Literature, this spring produced their own ebooks as part of their final projects for the class, and they are available for you to read.

These ebooks are modeled on John Green’s “The Anthropocene Reviewed” and briefly document a few instances where, in the spirit of John Green, our small lives come into contact with the larger

forces of the Anthropocene, according to the course instructor James Everett.

“The absolute breadth of experiences document here is just amazing,” Everett said. “From orcas in captivity, beach side tourist attractions, to issues of urbanization, and a good dose of just plain wonder at the world, these students really put themselves, their own, individual, unique lives, onto the page.”


The collection features 22 books made using “Book Creator,” an app that allows users to design their own books with images, text, and even embedded audio.















Alumni Spotlight:

Board of Trustees member Wayne Gilbert West '81

Gil West grew up in the mountains further west of Brevard, and when he was choosing a college, he knew he wanted to be close to home, his friends, and of course to play basketball.

From his leadership experience on campus as the captain of the Brevard College men’s basketball team, to a successful career as Chief Operating Officer of Delta Air Lines, and now in his role as Chief Operating Officer of Cruise Automation, Gil is not only leading the automotive industry through innovation but also giving back to his alma mater through his service as a Trustee.

As many of our students, Gil was unsure of what he wanted to do in life when it came to his education and career. However, he had an uncle who was an engineer and because Gil figured he was at least decent in math and science, he thought “why not”.

During his time here at Brevard College, he built his foundation in education and in creating a community on campus which is still his approach in the workforce today. “No matter how big they are, there is a circle of people and you develop a relationship,” he said

At Brevard, students connect with faculty and staff and even years later, Gil remembers fond relationships with classmates and professor Preston Woodruff who just always did things a little differently. Gil has held leadership roles with multiple airline companies and recently retired as Chief Operating Officer and Senior Vice President with Delta Airlines throughout his career.

Growing up around his dad’s automobile store,

he developed a love for transportation. Currently, Gil is the Chief Operating Officer with Cruise, an American self-driving car company, a subsidiary of General Motors.

Along with the advanced technology, Cruise is the first company to offer rides without a driver in a major public city and received California’s first driverless Deployment Permit this summer and as of this fall is expanding to Phoenix, Arizona and Austin, Texas. “What we are doing in San Francisco, is not way in the future, it’s now,” he said. “It’s truly a magical experience. Initially, you can’t believe it, then you quickly settle in and you have all of the space to yourself. I am living the dream for sure.”

As many of our alumni, Gil always recalled the importance of friendships and how special the community was during his time on campus. “Brevard College was a great experience; it prepares you for the rest of your life,” he said.

Gil currently serves on a few boards, including our Brevard College Board of Trustees. “All of us give back in life in some form,” he said. “Vision and leadership is key. Tapping into experience and wisdom creates the right environment to blossom, it’s great to be a part of that.

BC students have an afternoon at the opera

In February 2020, I applied for a mini-grant from Brevard College Pedagogies (BCP) to take some music students to see the opera “Agrippina,” by Handel.

We went, and it was a memorable experience—made more memorable since it was one of the last times in a theater before the March shut-down. I thought I would apply again this semester to give my music history students a chance to have a similar summative experience.

Six Brevard College students, and I went to see the performance of Terence Blanchard’s “Champion” Saturday afternoon, April 29, at the Biltmore Grande movie theater, off Long Shoals Road in South Asheville.

Blanchard has a career as a trumpet player, a pianist, a composer for over 40 film scores (includ-

ing a longstanding collaboration with Spike Lee), and has most recently supplemented that career by composing operas. With these credentials under his belt, one expects his operas won’t sound like Handel, Mozart, Verdi, or Puccini, though there are distant influences of all these composers.

The story centers around Emile Griffith, at one time a champion boxer. The students reflected on this experience.

Two art majors, Alison Holland and Jules Lusk, also went. It was their first time seeing an opera. Alison writes, “There were no viking helmets and people singing in foreign languages. Instead Champion incorporates jazz into its music and uses intricate design elements into its costumes to bring everything to life.”

Jules adds her appreciation of the importance of the sets, costumes and props to the story-telling. “To experience it live on stage was thrilling.... Even though we were not in the actual opera house,

I could feel the excitement.”

Music Education majors Ish Parsons and Patrick Yang reflected on this experience as part of their Final Exam in Music History. Ish wrote that the composer wrote very thoughtfully and strategically for this production. He pointed out that the use of color of the voices” is an important compositional tool. “The baritone quality of older and current Emile and his opposer Benny really give way to manhood and strength.” He noted the qualities of other voices, too, one of them being the club owner’s sultry jazz-oriented vocal style.

Patrick noted the themes of abandonment and dementia, the latter brought on by Griffith’s bouts in the boxing arenas and exacerbated by a beating from a gang of thugs outside a gay bar.

Patrick sums up all of our feelings: “I want to give thanks for this opportunity for the grant that was given for us Brevard College students. I really enjoyed the opera and the experience that I had.”

Voice of the Rivers exploring the Neuse River watershed

On May 8, 2023, the Voice of the Rivers team departed from Brevard College for the Neuse River watershed.

This team of 10 students and 4 faculty and staff began their journey at Falls Lake Recreation Area near Wake Forest, NC, and will paddle in sea kayaks just over 200 miles to reach Flanners Beach on the coast of North Carolina.

Voice of the Rivers (VOR) has a long history at Brevard College, with students participating in interdisciplinary “Learning in Community” courses along a river since 1997. These trips offer students the traditional 6 academic credit hours they earn in a LINC course, with the addition of spending 18 days learning and living together while exploring a watershed.

On the first VOR, the team started on the French Broad River and over the course of a semester paddled the Tennessee, Ohio and Mississippi rivers

before finishing at the Gulf of Mexico.

Since then, VOR teams have paddled the Haw and Cape Fear, Yadkin-Peedee, Savannah, Sewanee, and many other rivers, including the Rio Santa Cruz and Rio Negro in Patagonia.

The expeditionary LINC course is being led by Ryan DeGarmo, who is teaching River Recreation, Education, and Conservation, and Dr. Destini Pettitt, who is teaching Explorations in the Riparian Corridor. Clayton Sheehand, the WLEE logistics manager, and Maggie Frail, a recent WLEE graduate, have assisted in the planning process.

The students include Gunnar Ensign (junior, Art major), Eamonn Hunter (junior, Wilderness Leadership & Experiential Education major), Julianna Willoughby (junior, Environmental Studies major), Maddy Elliott (senior, Biology major), Catherine Schroeder (sophomore, Wilderness Leadership & Experiential Education major), Chantal Camenzind (senior, Exercise Science major), Hayley Kenney (junior, Criminal Justice major), Channing Barker (senior, Environmental Studies major), Tom Riches

(senior, Integrated Studies major), and Matt Zuniga (senior, Business & Organizational Leadership major).

Regarding the first full day of paddling, Zuniga says, “it was a beautiful day on the water and we are all getting used to our boats. 16 miles of paddling later, we arrived at our first campsite, a primitive island on the river—getting close with the bugs and mud, and really immersing ourselves in the outdoors.”

Some folks make a job change that takes them from one familiar situation to another. BC's Associate Dean for Students Alessandra (Le) Tavoloni is taking that big step, but, in many ways, is moving to an entirely new and uniquely different professional universe.

In her case, this is no surprise. Tavoloni is not known as someone who shrinks from a challenge—quite the opposite in fact.

Her personal roots are in Sao Paulo, Brazil. She grew up passionate about the game of soccer, a passion that still burns and continues to play a major role in her life. Following high school, Tavoloni's Brazilian coach connected her to Union College (Kentucky) Coach Helio D'Anna in 2002.

The result was a spectacular college career that included All Appalachian Athletic Conference and All American honors as she twice led her teams to NAIA national tournaments. She was inducted into the Union College Hall of Fame, having scored 106 goals (the 106 th on a bicycle kick) and joined an earlier Union graduate as the only two NAIA women players to have scored more than 100 goals up to that time.

Upon graduation, and having also completed a Master's degree in Education and Health, Tavoloni signed on as Director of Student Activities at Union, reporting to current BC, and former Union Dean of Students Debbie D'Anna.

Yes, that means that Tavoloni has twice worked for Dr. D'Anna, which tells one something about that special relationship

Tavoloni's new position, which begins this month, is that of Assistant Dean for Student Affairs at South University in Savannah, Georgia. Her responsibilities will include orientation, clubs and organizations, career fairs and graduation activities in the school's pharmacy program.

If you are not familiar with South, it is a professional school with several East Coast locations, offering health-related Ph.D degrees and boasting enrollment of some 10,000 students, many of whom study online.

"One of the things that drew me to the new job," Tavoloni said, "was the amazing diversity of both the faculty and administrators and the student body. I will be moving from working largely with younger, mostly regional, undergraduates to the challenge of working with more mature, career-focused

students from all over the world.

"I feel that this is the perfect career move for me at this time," she continued. "I know that I will miss my BC experience, my colleagues, and the many special people here. My memories of campus life have involved the pleasure of connecting, one on one, with students and doing my best to make their BC experience as rich as possible."

No matter where Le Tavoloni lands, soccer is sure to continue to loom large in her life. During her eight years at BC, she has played club soccer, refereed local high school and middle school matches and, for the past three years, served as the volunteer organizer of referees for the thriving Transylvania Youth Soccer Association.

"Le has many qualities that make her the perfect student affairs professional," said Dean D'Anna.

However, the one quality that stands out the most is her compassion for others. She has the heart to want to help others succeed.

"This quote by business and leadership author Ken Blanchard describes Le perfectly," D'Anna said. "Leadership is not about being in charge. It is about taking care of those who are in your charge. Servant leadership is about making goals clear, and then rolling up your sleeves and doing what it takes to help people win. In that situation, they don't work for you, you work for them.


"I have long known that Le is a special person," D'Anna continued. "I have been lucky to have worked with her for so many years. She will be missed more than words can express. I am proud of her for taking on this new challenge. South University is very lucky to get her."

Former BC President David Joyce echoed D'Anna. "Lynne and I have known Le for many years, both as a student and now as a professional," he said. "She is a woman of great energy and work ethic. She has a creative mind and is completely dedicated to student success. 
