Brevard business produces life-saving masks and more

Local Brevard business SylvanSport ,has turned from being an outdoor gear manufacturer to producing face masks and other personal-protection equipment (PPE) for medical personnel in the area.

This switch has affected other outdoor gear companies. According to a March 28 article in the Asheville Citizen-Times, some other regional factories which have turned their attention to manufacturing PPE include Kitsbow Cycling Apparel, Diamond Brand Gear in Fletcher, Asheville-based Industry Nine and Tsugo in Boone.

Brevard College alumnus Florian Pevssonneaux works at SylvanSport as the Sales and Marketing Coordinator. "It was an overnight decision," he said about the switch to making medical supplies. "We can be passive and wish people good luck, or we can take charge and do something about it."

Before focusing on the need of medical supplies, SylvanSport made trailers, backpacks, campers and a wide variety of outdoor gear. Now, they have fully revamped their facility and building process to support the development of face masks, gowns and face shields. SylvanSport has even been asked to offer their campers as shelters for those who are sick.

Tom Dempsey, founder and CEO of SylvanSport, has been in connection with many suppliers from the company's supply chain across the world. The Citizen- Times states, "His company has doubled down on seeking N95 and other approved PPE from its supply chains in Slovenia, Vietnam, China and Germany, and said more is on the way."

According to the Citizen-Times, many local hospitals and health departments have reached out to Dempsey and members of the SylvanSport team to acquire a portion of the desired PPE. SylvanSport has also been in correspondence with Dogwood Health Trust and, according to the Citizen-Times, they will be using part of this fund to get the supplies out to the people who need it.

They have been working with their suppliers to try and push out as many PPE as possible, which should be ready within the next few weeks. Their first round of face shields were delivered on March 30, 2020, and another 10,000 are in

production.

The Citizen-Times also mentions that many retailers in the area are interested in possible sneeze guards for their stores to act as a barrier between customers and cashiers. Dempsey is sure that SylvanSport can make those as well.

Peyssonneaux and the rest of SylvanSport hopes that this will be a success story for SylvanSport and the medical professionals they are helping. "We have to be flexible and adapt to the unique conditions," he said.

DuPont State Forest closes temporarily

As of March 24, DuPont State Recreational Forest is temporarily closed to the general public. This decision came after many other public lands, including DuPont, were flooded with people from out of state and in state. People were not following the social distancing guidelines to stay six feet apart, and because of this, access to the public land has been revoked for the time being.

The NC Forest Service did not take this action lightly, as they have stated so themselves. The land is for everyone, but in times like these, it is crucial that everyone does their part to contain the spread of the virus. This closure

includes all trailheads and forest facilities. Parking areas have been barricaded for public safety as well.

"Closing state forests to the public is a decision I do not take lightly, and much consideration has been given to this decision," said Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler. "The bottom line is that these sites are beautiful and treasured places in our state where families and visitors can make positive, lasting memories. These state forests have experienced what many state parks and beaches have, too-unsafe and overcrowded conditions that tax these resources. This temporary closure to the public is necessary, but rest assured, it is temporary."

During this time of turmoil, please be considerate to others by making

the right decision, which is to stay at home. Too many people have not fully understood what social distancing actually means, and flocked to the beautiful outdoors and mountains that are found here locally. By coming from different states, they could potentially be spreading the virus unknowingly.

April 1, 2020 | The Clarion COVID-19 UPDATES NC governor issues 'stay-at-home' order

North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper ordered people in the state to stay at home for 30 days, until April 29, 2020, in another step to slow the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus.

Cooper's Executive Order No. 121 limits the size of gatherings to 10 people but provides for essential businesses to continue to operate while prioritizing social distancing measures.

The order went into effect at 5 p.m. on Monday. It has the force of law and will be enforced in all 100 counties statewide.

"To continue our aggressive battle against COVID-19, I have signed a Stay at Home Order for the entire state of North Carolina," Cooper said when issuing the order on March 27. "Though it is difficult, we must do this to slow the disease spread. We need our medical system to be able to care for the friends and family we know will become seriously ill from the virus."

When he issued the order on Friday, Cooper noted that three North Carolinians had died due to COVID-19 and the state had 763 confirmed cases of the virus in 60 counties. Since then, the number of cases in North Carolina has doubled and the number of deaths has risen to at least eight.

Cooper called on all North Carolinians to protect themselves by staying home and following social distancing guidelines. North Carolina is now considered to have widespread transmission of the virus, which means people

who have tested positive cannot trace where they were exposed to the virus.

The order directs people to stay at home except to visit essential businesses, to exercise outdoors or to help a family member. Specifically, the order bans gatherings of more than 10 people and directs everyone to physically stay at least six feet apart from others.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) about the NC stay-at-home order

The governor's stay-at-home order permits the following businesses to remain open:

- · Restaurants that provide take-out, drivethru, or delivery
- Grocery stores
- ABC stores and beer and wine stores
- · Doctors and other healthcare providers
- Pharmacies
- Hardware stores
- Post offices
- Office supply stores
- · Gas stations and convenience stores
- · Veterinarians and pet supply stores
- · Hotels, airlines, buses, taxis, and rideshare services
 - Places of worship
 - Media organizations
- · Educational institutions providing remote learning opportunities

What does "Stay at Home" mean?

It means people should stay at their residence and limit social interactions and travel for essential activities or essential business purposes.

Is this Executive Order mandatory or is it just guidance?

This Order is mandatory. All persons and other entities are required to comply if they do not fall within the exemptions that are specified in the Order.

How will this Executive Order be enforced?

Gov. Cooper is seeking voluntary cooperation from all state residents and businesses to ensure the health and safety of our communities. If voluntary cooperation is not achieved, state and local law enforcement officers have the authority to enforce the Order.

Can I leave my home to visit friends or family members?

Individuals may leave their homes to care for a family member or friend, or to help their family member or friend get essential goods or receive necessary health care. Individuals should not visit with friends or family members if there is no urgent need.

Can I leave my home to exercise?

People are encouraged to maintain healthy lifestyles, including outdoor recreational activity, such as walking pets and jogging. While exercising, individuals should maintain social distancing and continue to take protective measures to maintain their personal health and wellbeing.

Does this Order prohibit outside group

As long as the group abides by the mass gatherings provision in the Order (no more than 10 people) and maintains adequate social distancing, this activity is not prohibited, but it is strongly discouraged.

What if my home is not a safe environment?

Individuals whose residences are unsafe or become unsafe, such as victims of domestic violence, are permitted and urged to leave their home and stay at a safe alternate location, which can include a hotel or shelter.

Does this Order prohibit operations of child care centers and other child care providers?

No. Although child care providers are urged to remain open for first responders and essential employees, they are also open to the general public. All open child

care providers must follow the NCDHHS emergency child care operations and financing guidance.

Can I still mail items and get deliveries?

Yes. The postal service and private mail and delivery services are essential businesses and will remain open.

What is the current number of people that can gather under the mass gathering requirements?

A mass gathering is defined as no more than ten (10) people.

Are religious functions allowed?

Religious gatherings are subject to the mass gathering ban and may not have more than 10 people. Participants should practice social distancing.

Are weddings allowed?

Weddings are subject to the mass gathering ban and may not have more than 10 people. Participants should practice social distancing.

Are funerals allowed?

Funerals are time-sensitive events and may not have more than 50 people. Participants should practice social distancing.

What are social distancing requirements?

- Maintain at least a six foot distance from other individuals
- Wash hands using soap and water for at least twenty seconds as frequently as possible or the use of hand sanitizer;
 - · Regularly clean high-touch surfaces;
- · Facilitate online or remote access by customers if possible.

Dust Bunnies ** proliferating on Brevard campus

Everyone has encountered Dust Bunnies, even if they didn't realize it. Most of the time they are overlooked, which is to their liking, and live out their fluffball lives out of sight and out of mind of their unsuspecting roommates.

These small creatures spontaneously generate in many rooms all over the world but are only seen as a minor, if embarrassing, inconvenience. They tend to favor small spaces and will often be seen on hard, smooth surfaces.

While the reasoning for this flooring preference is unknown, it may be due to the ease of movement the Dust Bunnies have when crossing these surfaces. This idea is supported on the limited sightings of wild Dust Bunnies living in carpeted rooms or on rugs.
