Tiger Woods injured in major car crash

Tiger Woods, golf legend and one of the most famous American athletes of all time, was involved in a serious, single-vehicle rollover crash on Feb. 23, 2021, with the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department responding at approximately 7:12 a.m. It has been concluded that Tiger could have not paid much attention while driving and drifted off the road. In accidents like this it is a good thing to hear that he made it out safely, while sustaining some injuries.

Woods walked away with significant leg injuries, specifically on his right leg, but after a few days he's been doing well and it seems like he will make it. He suffered a few open fractures that affected the upper and lower portions of his tibia and fibula, as screws and pins were inserted to allow his foot to be stabilized. These injuries will set Tiger out for a few months, but

he plans on attending the Masters Tournament in April of this year.

Tiger Woods has won 15 championships, is tied for first, at four PGA wins, five Master's wins and three U.S. Open wins; he could potentially be the greatest golfer of all time. This accident may be used as a learning opportunity for him in regards to safe driving.

People can take a lot out of this story because, for one, it teaches safety while driving. One can never know what could happen; it would be a sad day if the world lost Tiger, especially after losing people like Kobe Bryant, Juice Wrld, Pop Smoke and many more.

Even though Woods plans to be present at tournaments in the near future, his road to recovery is planned to be long and uncertain. Hopefully his health will allow for a quick spring back into playing.

Gov. Cooper lifts 10 p.m. curfew, BC follows lead

Ohio patient the first to receive Johnson & Johnson **COVID-19** vaccine

The one-dose COVID-19 vaccine formulated by Johnson and Johnson has officially been administered in the United States. 86-year-old Barbara Schmalenberger was the first person to receive Johnson and Johnson's vaccine, at the Schottenstein Center, in Columbus, Ohio. Schmalenberger received the vaccine only days after it was authorized to be dispersed, and is the first of millions of people the vaccine is set to reach.

"It was really exciting," Schmalenberger told CNN after getting the shot. "When I got out of my car, I was shaking and I was so excited. I couldn't wait."

The third COVID-19 vaccine now available to Americans was approved for emergency authorization by the Food and Drug Administration and is said to be the more efficient vaccine of the three. From CNN, "The vaccine is set to be a cost-effective alternative to the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, and can be stored in a refrigerator instead of a freezer." The

J&J vaccine is also a single-dose shot, unlike Moderna and Pfizer, meaning patients would not have to return for an additional dose.

From the New York Times: "Experts pointed out that the Johnson & Johnson vaccine will be simpler to distribute than the other two vaccines, which are made by Moderna and Pfizer with its German partner BioNTech... Health professionals have noted that it could be particularly well suited to remote areas and clinics as well as drive-through mass vaccination sites."

According to Johnson and Johnson, "The Company has begun shipping its COVID-19 vaccine and expects to deliver enough singleshot vaccines by the end of March to enable the full vaccination of more than 20 million people in the U.S. The Company plans to deliver 100 million single-shot vaccines to the U.S. during the first half of 2021."

Americans can look forward to having better access to COVID-19 vaccinations, as millions of doses of Johnson and Johnson's vaccine are expected to ship around the nation this week.

New York residents rise against Anti-Asian violence

There are a lot of Asian Americans that are scared to leave their houses since they are afraid to be attacked and potentially killed. Asian Americans are living in fear.

There were rallies in New York to protest the wave of attacks that were targeted against Asian American people. These protests come after there was a 36-year-old Asian American man that was stabbed on Thursday in the streets of New York.

New York Attorney General, Letitia James, who is encouraging any people at the rally to report any hate crimes that they encounter during the protest. She states, "Come to my office so we can report on these individuals who hate us, so we can shut them down. Any attack on one of us is an attack against all of us," James said.

The rally was initially held by the Asian American Federation (AAF), which is an umbrella organization that advocates for better policies and services for Asian Americans. The Federation says that there "were nearly 500 bias incidents or hate crimes in 2020, ranging from verbal to physical assaults, to being coughed at or spat upon, to shunning, among other forms

of discrimination "

The numbers were collected by the AAF, the advocacy group Stop AAPI (Asian American Pacific Islanders) Hate, the NYPD and the NYC Commission on Human Rights, according to the AAF.

City residents Will Lex Ham said there were many of his family members having to live in fear and are dealing with anxiety from all the attacks that have happened. He also stated that the Asian community does not receive resources in proportion to its population in the city, state, and the nation.

Senate to determine passage of Biden's \$1.9 trillion COVID-19 relief plan

The House of Representatives narrowly passed President Biden's American Rescue Plan Act, the \$1.9 trillion COVID-19 stimulus package, early Saturday morning. President Biden's pandemic aid package took a leap forward, as his administration is working to enact the first legislative priority to recover from the impacts of COVID-19. The relief package passed, with no help from House Republicans, with a final vote of 219 to 212.

Rep. Kurt Schrader of Oregon and Rep. Jared Golden of Maine were the only Democrats that went against their party lines, voting against the bill. Though the package passed through the House without bipartisan support, the bill will move onto the Senate.

Biden met with Democratic Senate members on Tuesday to discuss the plan, urging Democrats to support the bill, as Majority Leader Senator Chuck Schumer plans to take it on in the Senate this week. Biden and Schumer are pressing to keep the bill moving forward, as unemployment benefits are scheduled to begin lapsing on March 14. Biden and Schumer will need all Senate Democrats to vote in favor of the bill to create a 50-50 partisan vote split (as Republicans plan to vote against the package), allowing Vice President Kamala Harris to break the tie.

On Monday, President Biden met with eight Democratic senators, along with one Independent, Angus King, who often caucuses with Democrats. The group, according to a statement from the White House, "was united in the goal of quickly passing a significant package that reflects the scope of the challenges our country is facing."

According to CNN: "...all eyes are on the Senate, where Majority Leader Chuck Schumer could bring the Covid package -which includes direct checks, small business aid, and funding for schools, state and local governments and vaccine distribution -- to the floor as early as Wednesday." However, 11 Senate Democrats are urging Biden to add "recurring direct payments and enhanced jobless benefits in the economic recovery and infrastructure plan he will try to pass this year," said a source from CNN.

Among the group who are pushing for further stimulus aid are Senate Finance Committee Chair Ron Wyden, Senate Budget Committee Chair Bernie Sanders, Senate Banking Committee Chair Sherrod Brown, Sens. Elizabeth Warren and Ed Markey of Massachusetts, Sen. Cory Booker of New Jersey, Sen. Michael Bennet of Colorado, Sen. Tammy Baldwin of Wisconsin, Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand of New York. Sen. Alex Padilla of California and Sen. Richard Blumenthal of Connecticut. It will all depend on the remaining members of the Senate and Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, once the bill is brought into play.

According to CNBC: "Democrats, who narrowly control both chambers of Congress, would have to pass the legislation through

budget reconciliation. They are using the process, which enables them to approve bills without Republicans in the Senate, to pass their coronavirus aid plan.

It is unclear now if the recurring payments could win the support of the most conservative Senate Democrats. The party needs every member on board to win a simple majority in the 50-50 Senate. Sens. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., and Kyrsten Sinema, D-Ariz., have expressed concerns about both the scope of \$1,400 direct payments and the \$15 per hour federal minimum wage initially included in the pandemic relief bill."

As of now, no House Republicans or GOP Senators have supported the bill or voted in favor of the expanded stimulus package. The Senate will need every Democrat's vote in order to successfully provide and pass some form of legislation to relieve COVID-19 distress.

BC students take historical walk through Rosenwald

Rosenwald is a historically black neighborhood located in Brevard, North Carolina. On Wednesday, Feb. 24 at 11 a.m., Brevard College held a historical walking tour for students and staff through Rosenwald. The tour was led by Dr. Jordan Kuck, Assistant Professor of History at Brevard College.

After an assessment last semester of the Rosenwald walk by The Clarion Copy Editor, Aia Andonovska, this is an updated look at the walking tour. See Volume 86, Issue 9 of The Clarion for more information.

The walk had a good turn out of around 30 students and 10 faculty members. The tour started out by leaving the Bell Tower meeting place, a centerpiece of Brevard College and heading off campus by way of the wall. It took about five intersections or 0.8 miles for the group to reach Rosenwald.

The tour started at the old Rosenwald school. The old schoolhouse is very small and is now used for offices for members of the school board of Brevard. The school sat at the top of a large hill and it was explained that the location was "out of sight, out of mind."

The school was used prior to segregation, when discussing desegregation in schools. Mel Bringle, professor of Philosophy and Religious studies at Brevard College, told a story from when she was in high school in North Carolina. Bringle told everyone of the time desegregation was first starting, her school had three black female students and how they would often be

found in the bathroom leaning on each other's shoulders.


It was a very sad story, but history is not all sunshine and rainbows. Next up, the tour group left the school and walked to the old activity building. The old activity center is no longer standing where it once did.

The group discussed the neighborhood around the activity center and the old leather facility that could be seen from that location. The facility used to pollute the water in the neighborhood creeks and many of the people in the neighborhood used to also work there.

The last part of the walk was the group seeing the new historical marks. There are 30 markers and each one talks about the history of Rosenwald while simultaneously marking historical sites in the neighborhood. For example, one plaque told the story about "Moms Mabley", an American comedian and actress, who was one of the most famous people to come out of Brevard.

The Social Action Leadership Team (SALT), along with their newsletter at Brevard College, sent out an issue on Feb. 22 presenting the entire life history of "Moms Mabley." SALT had organized the walking tour through Rosenwald.

Overall, everyone seemed to enjoy the historical walking tour through Rosenwald, even though almost everyone said their feet were sore after the walk. Hopefully SALT will be able to put on another great event soon.



Daft Punk splits up after 28 years

On Feb. 22, 2021, French electronic music duo Daft Punk announced that they had officially ended their 28-year run. The statement comes from a YouTube video on their channel titled "Epilogue" featuring a clip from their 2006 film "Electroma."

Throughout the 28 years, Daft Punk released four studio albums, one soundtrack album for "Tron: Legacy," 23 singles and 19 music videos. Notable singles include "Harder, Better, Faster, Stronger" and "Get Lucky." "Random Access Memories" remains the band's most successful album in the United States being certified platinum by the RIAA. The announcement of their break up led to a sales surge of digital album purchases.



One year later, Baby still has "Sum 2 Prove"

One year ago, Dominique Jones, otherwise known as Lil Baby, released one of the biggest and most influential rap projects of the last decade. "My Turn," by Baby, was his eighth project and by far his most successful. The project featured appearances from fellow acclaimed rappers Gunna, Lil Uzi Vert, Young Thug and Future. The album also included the introduction of 42 Dugg, a prodigy of Lil Baby.

Released on Feb. 28th., 2020, the album instantly was met with great acclaim. Many were expecting a great project upon the release of the lead single, "Whoa," which was released in Nov. of 2019.

A lot of rappers would rest after releasing such an extensive and quality project, not Lil Baby. In wake of social justice issues in the Summer of 2020, Baby released yet another of the year's biggest singles: "The Bigger Picture." This song was used as somewhat of an anthem for the BLM movement.

The Atlanta rapper is continuing to make new music and dropped two new songs at the end of 2020. 2021 looks to be an even bigger year for Lil Baby. Hopefully, we will be looking back in a year on another phenomenal project from the 4PF artist.
