Beam catches cold

First-year students will soon enjoy air conditioning in Beam Residence Hall. Chris Center, Director of Housing for Brevard College, recalls his sweltering time in Beam Hall, initially as a first-year student and then as an RA for his remaining three years. Later, when Center returned in a staff role as Beam Hall Director, he remembers wondering why the delay in making the building climate-controlled. "There was a lot of talk about it, but nothing was happening," said Center.

According to the Winter 1994 issue of Brevard Magazine, Lena Sue Beam Residence Hall was built in 1966, as part of a long-range plan envisioned by Brevard College's fifth president, Dr. Emmett Kennedy McLarty, and named for the wife of Trustee C. Grier Beam. Other buildings that were added to the campus, from 1961 to 1969, as a result of Dr. McLarty's vision, include Moore Science Building, Boshamer

Gymnasium, Beam Administration Building, Jones Library, Myers Dining Hall and McLarty-Goodson, comprising much of the campus as we know it today.

Center was glad to see the ball start rolling this year, with construction beginning mid-summer under the supervision of Burke Ulrey, Director of Facilities at Brevard College. The plan was to have the cold air blowing by the time students moved in, but several delays have pushed the original goal out an additional week or two.

These delays include supply shortages and staffing shortages, possibly due to COVID-19, having to retro-fit the aged building for the new A/C, and waiting on the city of Brevard to install a new transformer necessary for the additional electrical demands. Each hallway and each living area will have its own unit.

With average highs in the mid 80's forecasted during BC's first week of classes, working A/C will likely bring welcome relief to residents of Beam Hall.

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COVID-19 policy

An email sent out to Brevard College at 1:39 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 23 reads, "Now that a Covid-19 vaccine (Pfizer) has been fully approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), we will begin to implement the Brevard College Covid-19 Vaccination Policy. Effective immediately, Faculty and Staff are required to be vaccinated with more information coming from Human Resources. All students will need to be fully vaccinated by January 2, 2022. More information for students will be sent from Campus Life."

The email from the Brevard College President comes at no shock since there were originally plans to require the vaccination this semester. The decision was made to not require the vaccination this semester because of the 76 to 21 percent vaccination rate to unvaccinated rate, as stated in an email sent on Aug. 19 titled Updated COVID Policy.

On Jan. 2, 2022, Brevard College will require all students to be vaccinated. To help students become vaccinated, Brevard College is hosting free vaccination clinics for anyone who wishes to become vaccinated in the Porter Center.

With the vaccine becoming more available and soon being required for students, Brevard College seems to be lifting a handful of the restrictions from last year. For starters, there is

no longer one-way in the halls or doors.

In the cafeteria, students will still be served their food, but now they can grab their own silverware. Plus, it is much easier for students or faculty to sit with others while eating. Many places on campus have opened up more seating for students to sit together and hang out. For example, Coltrane Underground, with many new social activities like pool, video games or ping pong, to name a few.

Brevard College seems to be becoming more lively again after all the COVID chaos. Of course, some protocols are still in place from COVID. For example, students can only use water fountains for filling water bottles.

The rule for the masks is "The college made a decision... to reinstate the mask mandate for all indoor spaces. Masks must be worn over the mouth and nose at all times while inside all buildings. The mandate will apply to vaccinated and unvaccinated community members." As stated by Debora D'Anna in an email to the Brevard College community.

Even though the college has many restrictions in place, students can still enjoy some fun COVID safe activities on campus. According to Le Tavoloni, there will be "...tons of student activities through Student Government, Clubs and Campus Activity Board."

I am very pleased to welcome you to the 2020-21 academic year at Brevard College. Unfortunately, while we were hoping for a semester free from the anxiety and stress of COVID, that is not the case. COVID is still a part of our daily lives.

This means face-to-face instruction with dedicated faculty and staff members to assist you in your journey. We need your help to make this happen. We must take care of each other by wearing our masks at all times indoors, remaining at least three feet apart, washing our hands often, reporting symptoms, weekly testing and getting vaccinated. Unfortunate happenings in Pisgah Forest

On Aug. 14, an oak tree fell on top of two cars travelling down U.S. 276 in Pisgah Forest. One person was killed and three others were severely injured. The U.S. Forest Service was set to perform an assessment to gather what happened to cause the fall.

"There was no storm there at the time," said Brevard Fire Chief Bobby Cooper, who was one of many present among several first responders to the accident. "I think it was just a tree that was rotten at the base that fell."

The Clarion writing staff's hearts go out to those injured in the accident and to the loved ones close to the departed.

Pisgah National Forest has been under strict ruling, as many parts of the forest have been closed down due to the COVID-19 pandemic and recent severe weather. Several roads, trails and picnic areas are closed, but are expected to start opening up again in the future. As of May 18, the following is a list of roads and trails currently unavailable to the public, from the Pisgah Conservancy website.

The destruction of Tropical Storm Fred

Tropical Storm Fred has reached North Carolina and Tennessee and has caused severe floods, leading to missing persons and destruction across counties.

Fred made landfall at 2:15 p.m. CDT near Cape San Blas, Florida, with winds of 65 mph. It was the fourth named storm to make a United States landfall this season, following Claudette, Danny and Elsa.

There are at least four confirmed deaths in Haywood County, North Carolina; their names have not yet been released. Several people still continue to be missing. One Haywood County survivor said, "I just saw everything floating away."

Nearly 100 people have been rescued from their homes, the North Carolina Department of Public Safety said in a news release. The flooding of Pigeon River has been categorized as historic.

In Tennessee, rainfall has shattered records of the water levels in the Piney River. At least 11 inches of rain hit Hickman County on Saturday morning. A state of emergency has been declared through Saturday afternoon in Dickson, Hickman, Houston and Humphreys counties. The Nashville Weather Service called this situation "life threatening."

More than 200 rescuers have been searching for people on foot, through water, using K-9

units and in the air in the past week as the number of missing persons rises. Over 500 families have been displaced from their homes in North Carolina, alone.

Workers are using heavy equipment to attempt to clear the debris left. It will likely take weeks to fully clean the aftermath. At least 10 bridges have been destroyed or damaged in Haywood County.

To help, the Franklin Fire Department in Tennessee is asking for donations of things like water bottles, diapers and non-perishable foods. You can call 828-356-2022 to directly donate, volunteer and more.




Chart detailing Tropical Storm Fred's path.



BC's decision amidst Delta variant surges

Brevard College reinstates mask policy and will require students to be vaccinated, as COVID-19 concerns grow

Brevard College was set on achieving a maskless fall 2021 semester, after a long year of wearing masks during the COVID-19 pandemic. Last semester, all students were required to wear facemasks while inside any academic building, dorm residence, or public space around campus; the only exception being inside one's own dorm room, or outside, socially distanced. Overall, BC did an exceptional job of caring for its students and providing for those who were quarantined, isolated, or infected with the virus.

The college held numerous COVID-19 testing clinics for students, athletes, faculty and staff. BC even hosted on-campus vaccinations, supplying students with a free shot of the Janssen COVID-19 single-dose vaccine, made by Johnson & Johnson. Students were able to sign up to receive the vaccine last spring, inside Boshamer Gymnasium.

Personally, I was quarantined twice last year; the first time, because I experienced several COVID-19 like symptoms and had to be moved into the guest house until I received a negative test result. As it turned out, I was negative; I merely caught the flu. The second time, last semester in the spring, I was exposed to someone that tested positive, and once again, I was moved into quarantine, that time into the basement of Beam Residential Hall.

Once again, I was to remain there until I had a negative COVID-19 test result; and I did. I am very lucky to have managed to avoid catching the virus, and I am grateful for everything BC did to make my stay in quarantine comfortable. Debbie D'Anna, Vice President for Student Success and Dean for Students, checked in on me, personally, to inquire if there was anything I needed and if there was anything she could do to make me more comfortable.

On top of that, I am proud of how the college operated during such trying times. I cannot imagine how much the faculty sacrificed to make sure students got everything they needed. How much they worked, tirelessly, under




Chart showing new COVID-19 cases in the U.S. from Jan. 20, 2020, to Aug. 24, 2021

immense stress, for us, the students, putting themselves at risk for our wellbeing. I am forever grateful.

Enforcing the mask policy, installing hand sanitizer dispensers everywhere around campus, providing students and faculty with those weird temperature-taking, selfie scanning printers and providing vaccines, only brush the surface of the positive changes made to keep students and faculty safe and on campus.

When I first heard about how it was Brevard College's intention to work toward a mask free, fall 2021 semester, I was worried. First, because I knew that not all students would get vaccinated. Second, there was no guarantee that the country, let alone Brevard, would be in a place where it would be considered safe to be in public without a mask.

And third, athletic teams have been responsible for many of the outbreaks of COVID-19 around campus; to my knowledge,

BC was not planning on restricting sports in the fall. Of course, I could not see into the future, so maybe it was possible that Brevard College could be mask free. I had my doubts, but I was hopeful, especially upon hearing a rumor that vaccines would be required for students to return to campus in the fall.

Lo and behold, on Aug. 2, Debbie D'Anna said the following in an email: "The College decided not to require the vaccine until the Emergency Use Authorization is lifted and strongly encourages everyone to get the vaccine. The College will require the vaccine once the Emergency Use Authorization has been lifted. Brevard College will host several vaccine clinics on campus to make getting vaccines very easy. We urge you to consider getting the vaccine before arriving on campus."

With the Delta variant surging across the country, and COVID-19 becoming

more transmissible and insidiously deadly (particularly to unvaccinated individuals), this email made me consider not returning to campus this semester. But alas, here I am, and the FDA has fully approved the Pfizer vaccine.

On Aug. 23, President David Joyce said the following in an email, about how BC "...will begin to implement the Brevard College Covid-19 Vaccination Policy. Effective immediately, Faculty and Staff are required to be vaccinated with more information coming from Human Resources. All students will need to be fully vaccinated by January 2, 2022."

I cannot put into words the relief that I felt after reading that email. I know many students felt the same feeling I did, as well. And I am thankful Brevard College made the decision that it did.

COVID-19 is real. The Delta variant is real, and is an active threat. Where I am from, in Polk county, Florida, nearly 80 percent of inpatient

hospital beds are in use.

At my local hospital, Lakeland Regional Medical Center, 85 percent of ICU beds are in use. Just this past month, 19,346 new COVID-19 cases have been reported in Polk county, Florida, alone, bringing the total to 100,347 cases. According to NPR, as of Sunday in the state of Florida, "1 in 4 hospital beds in the state had a COVID-19 patient in it."

"The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported 23,903 new coronavirus cases in Florida on Friday, the state's highest single-day total since the start of the pandemic." In total, throughout the state, hospitals are at a more than 83 percent occupancy rate. In total, 44 percent of Florida's ICU beds are occupied by COVID-19 patients.

I say all of this because I want my peers to understand how serious this pandemic is. I want people to know that others do not have it so lucky. Individuals who are vaccinated can

still catch and spread the virus. Those who are unvaccinated are at high risk of catching the virus and getting critically ill.

To my peers, I urge you all to follow BC's mask policy and COVID-19 protocols, and above all else, I urge you to get vaccinated. Take advantage of the vaccination clinics here on campus. The amount of students I see in MG and in my classes not wearing their masks properly, below their noses and chins, is appalling. Frankly, it's a sign of ignorance, privilege and selfishness.

Per President Joyce's email, "Free Vaccination Clinics are offered on campus from 9 a.m. – 4 p.m. at the Porter Center in the mobile vaccine unit Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of this week." I hope a similar schedule applies for next week, but if not, be checking your BC email for updates. Let's make it a great semester, and do our part to keep our campus COVID free.




Chart detailing new hospital admissions in the U.S. due to COVID-19.

Football picked second in USA South Conference preseason coaches poll

BREVARD, N.C. – Following the first back-to-back winning seasons in program history, the Brevard College Football team was selected second in the Fall 2021 USA South Conference Preseason Coaches Poll. The selection comes fresh off a Spring 2021 season that saw Brevard finish with a 4-1 overall record and a USA South Conference West Division Co-Championship.

The Tornados earned a pair of first-place votes in addition to its 54 total points in the poll, earning BC the two-spot in the tabulation. Huntingdon College edged out BC, receiving five first-place votes and 58 points in the poll.

The defending USA South Conference East Division Champion Methodist University was slotted behind the Tornados in third place, receiving 48 points. Averett University and Maryville College finished tied-for-fourth in the tabulation, with each institution obtaining a first-place vote and 41 points each.

NC Wesleyan College (sixth, 31 points), LaGrange College (seventh, 21 points), Southern Virginia University (eighth, 18 points), and Greensboro College (ninth, 12 points) rounded out the annual poll. The conference features nine members for the 2021 campaign, with newcomer Southern Virginia joining the field.

Brevard will look to continue to build upon its recent success, as the Tornados compete for a conference championship and their first opportunity at an NCAA DIII Tournament berth. The Tornados, under fifth-year Head Coach Bill Khayat, feature a squad heavy with returners in addition to 60-plus newcomers.

On offense, the Tornados return sophomore quarterback Eli Carr. The local Asheville, North Carolina product by way of A.C. Reynolds High School sparked the Tornado offense while playing in nine quarters of action in Spring, 2021. Carr completed 39-of-55 passes for 462 yards and five touchdowns to help lead the BC offense. Senior running back Aaron Bennett returns after a Spring 2021 campaign that saw the Gastonia, North Carolina native earn USA South All-Conference West Division plaudits. Bennett has accumulated 593 yards on the ground through his three-year Tornado career while scoring four times. BC's leading rusher from a season ago, junior running back Mitchell Yoder, also joins Bennett in a loaded backfield for the Tornados.

Senior wide receiver Dalton Cole returns

following a season that saw the Hendersonville, North Carolina product shift roles, leading to a selection on the D3football.com Team of the Week. Cole amassed 279 all-purpose yards, scoring through the air and on the ground, including three rushing touchdowns in the season finale against NC Wesleyan College. The Tornados also return a majority of an offensive line that was selected as a D3football.com Team of the Week recipient.

Defensively, the Tornados return a majority of its vaunted starting lineup which has produced some of the best numbers in the nation over the last two seasons. Junior defensive back Joc Pledger earned numerous honors after a breakout sophomore campaign in Spring. The Monroe, Georgia native picked off five passes en route to the school's first All-American selection in the NCAA DIII era. Pledger earned a spot on the Spring 2021 D3football.com All-American Second Team in addition to a D3football.com Team of the Week selection earlier in the season. Most recently, Pledger earned a Preseason All-American Second Team honor from D3football.com.

Dante Anderson, a returning senior defensive back from Hartwell, Georgia, racked up 32 tackles and an interception en route to a USA South All-Conference West Division honor and

a D3football.com Team of the Week selection.

The Tornados also return standout linebackers Steffon Canady and Toby Naylor from their Spring 2021 squad. Naylor led all Tornados with 37 total tackles, earning BC's first All-Region selection on the D3football.com All-Region Second Team. Canady returns for his third season in a Tornado uniform, bringing back a resume including 95 career tackles, 13 career sacks, and MVP of the 2019 Scotty Whitelaw Bowl. BC returns starting specialists Stamati Damalos and Damon Hewitt to its 2021 squad as well.

The Tornados are slated to kick their 2021 season off on Saturday, September 4, when Brevard travels to Rome, Georgia to face NCAA DII Shorter University at 12 p.m. Brevard opens its home schedule up at Ives-Lemel Family Field on Saturday, September 11, hosting The Apprentice School at 1 p.m.

BC men's soccer selected as preseason West Division favorites

BREVARD, N.C. – Following a Spring 2021 campaign that saw the Brevard College men's soccer program capture its first USA South title in the West Division Tournament, the Tornados have been picked as the preseason favorites in the USA South Conference West Division in the conference's annual preseason coaches poll.

Brevard joins East Division preseason favorite NC Wesleyan College at the top of its respective poll, with the Tornados garnering four first-place votes and tallying 34 overall points. BC edged Covenant College, who the Tornados downed in a 5-3 penalty shootout in the Spring to decide the West Division Tournament champion. The Scots received a pair of first-place votes and 32 points in the poll.

Piedmont University, who Brevard defeated twice last season, finished third in the West Division poll, capturing the remaining first-place vote and 27 points. Maryville College (fourth, 17 points), Huntingdon College (fifth, 16 points), LaGrange College (sixth, 14 points), and Berea College (seventh, seven points) round out the preseason tabulation.

Brevard comes into the Fall campaign on the heels of its most successful season in the NCAA era. The Tornados finished the Spring 2021 campaign with a 6-2-1 overall record that included a vaunted 5-1 home mark and a 4-1 conference record. Brevard's West Division Tournament title marked the program's first postseason championship in the NCAA-era, coming in its fifth overall postseason appearance in its NCAA history.

BC featured one of the most dynamic offenses at the DIII level last Spring, logging 31 goals and 24 assists through nine games played. The Tornados were top-10 in goal differential, assists, and goals scored in the Spring campaign.

BC returns numerous key contributors from last year's team alongside an incoming class of 12 new Tornados. Fifth-year senior Adam Spencer returns after a breakout senior campaign that saw the Mooresville, North Carolina product log five goals and three assists for 13 points to help lead the Tornado offense. The forward was honored with a USA South All-Conference West Division First Team selection, and earned a pair of awards from United Soccer Coaches – Men's Scholar All-Region and Player Award of Distinction. Spencer has tallied 10 goals, five assists, and

25 points in his four-year Brevard career.

Sophomore defender Sam O'Callaghan burst onto the scene for the Tornados in Spring 2021, leading all Tornados with four assists en route to a USA South All-Conference West Division First Team selection. Sophomore forward Ryan Lynch was also honored by the conference with an All-Conference West Division Second Team award, as the Charlotte native logged three goals for the Tornados.

The Tornados, led by third-year Head Coach Helio "L" D'Anna and Associate Head Coach Juan Mascaro Jr. wrap up their preseason on Saturday, hosting Southern Wesleyan University at 4:30 p.m. at Ives-Lemel Family Field in an exhibition contest. Brevard's regular season kicks off at 7 p.m. on Thursday, September 2 when the Tornados play host to Carolina University at 7 p.m. on Ives-Lemel Family Field.
