Brevard has upped its grocery game! The long awaited ALDI is finally here at 165 Asheville Highway, next door to Zaxby's.

On Thursday, Sept. 2, there will be a ribbon cutting ceremony at 8:45 a.m., and the doors will open at 9 a.m. From this point on, it will be open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day.

This store opening is part of an aggressive expansion plan to open approximately 100 stores in 2021 across the country. The new locations, which are part of the company's "coast-to-coast expansion" plan, will be spread out across Arizona, California, Florida and the Northeast.

ALDI is on track to become the third largest U.S. retailer by the end of 2022, currently operating 2,000 stores in 37 states.

"We have served this community for more than 20 years and look forward to continuing to offer Brevard residents high-quality, fresh foods and low prices in every ALDI aisle, every day," said Shaun O'Keefe, Jefferson regional vice president for ALDI.

ALDI says, "we believe our shoppers' money should go right where they want it to: into great-tasting food they can feel good about serving their families. ALDI's mission is to provide high quality food that is accessible and affordable."

ALDI is still currently hiring, too. If you are

On Sunday, Hurricane Ida hit the coast of Louisiana, with a title as one of the most powerful storms to ever hit the U.S. and violent winds of 150 mph.

Coincidentally, Ida's landfall came on the same date as Hurricane Katrina crashed through Louisiana and Mississippi. Ida is about 40 miles West of Katrina's landfall. It is very close to one of the country's main centers for drilling and moving oil.

Before power was lost on the Louisiana barrier island, cameras caught the water slowly rising as palm trees were shaken around. When water began flooding out of Lake Pontchartrain in New Orleans, officials said Ida's swift intensification from a few thunderstorms to massive hurricane over three days left no time to organize a mandatory evacuation of its 390,000 residents.

Mayor LaToya Cantrell urged residents to

leave, but not all had the chance. The ones left were warned of long power outages amidst the intense humidity. Cars were parked in the medians to help provide a few extra feet of protection against flooding.

Ida began to threaten Port Fourchon, the port that handles a fifth of the nation's domestic oil and gas. Ida was also threatening a region that had already been reeling because of COVID-19. There were low vaccination rates and high hospitalizations due to the Delta variant.

New Orleans hospitals were planning to ride the storm through with the beds mostly full, as most hospitals in the area had little room for evacuated patients. Shelters for those fleeing also acted as a hotspot for the variant.

Forecasters warned winds of 115 mph were expected in Houma, a city that supports oil platforms in the Gulf and Gulfport. Gov. John Bel Edwards vowed Louisiana's "resilient and tough people" would weather the storm.

Louisiana officials were attempting to find hotels for evacuated residents to lower the number of people using shelters. President Joe Biden approved emergency declarations for Louisiana and Mississippi ahead of Ida's arrival, so this act was already in motion once the storm hit.

Ida is said to be stronger than Katrina, but officials stressed that the levee and drainage systems protecting New Orleans had been much improved. Meteorologists said Hurricane Ida is full of "explosive intensification," going from 85 mph winds to 150 mph winds in a matter of 24 hours.

To help with relief efforts of Hurricane Ida, there are more than a few organizations to turn to. Imagine Water Works, Cajun Navy Relief, Another Gulf is Possible Collaborative and NOLA Ready are all places to donate and volunteer, along with many others discoverable with a simple Google search.




## **Security report**

# Former felons' voting rights to be restored in North Carolina

The North Carolina Superior Court in Raleigh has ordered a restoration of voting rights for thousands in the state. In what will be one of the greatest expansions of civil rights in recent decades. With around 56,000 individuals regaining the right to vote.

After facing several lawsuits from civil rights groups in NC, on the basis that the loss of voting rights was unconstitutional and stemmed back to white supremacy in the 19th century, the three judge NC Superior Court ordered the restoration.

According to NC state law convicted persons are barred from voting until they are fully released from probation, suspended sentences, or parole. This ruling makes NC the only state in the South where persons released will automatically have their voting rights renewed.

Darryl Attkinson, the Co-founder of a Civil Rights group in Durham called Forward Justice, stated to the Washington Post "This lawsuit was about us making sure that we include the 56,000 North Carolinians living in our community, paying taxes, dropping kids at school are included in 'We, the people,'".

A group of attorneys, representing republican lawmakers, were denied a halt on the restoration. On the same day the panel also published an explanation as to why they reauthorized the ability to vote to the thousands of convicted felons in NC.

Two of the Raliegh Superior Court Judges stated to the Associated Press, "There is no denying the insidious, discriminatory history surrounding voter disenfranchisement and efforts for voting rights restoration in North Carolina."

The Raleigh Superior Court has also amended that felons will not be required to any monetary obligations before the restoration of their voting rights if they had fulfilled all other requirements from their sentencing. Due to the differences in class, in felons, it would have meant unequal opportunity for regaining their rights.

## What is going on in Afghanistan?

The plan to pull U.S. troops out of the country is accomplished, but came at a price

On Aug. 16, 2021 President Joe Biden addressed the nation on the United States' intentions in Afghanistan as war and turmoil has continued throughout the past two decades. In his speech, Biden stressed that Americans stationed or fighting in Afghanistan would be returning to the U.S., as it was revealed that the President's plan was to bring home all of the troops in combat.

"American troops cannot and should not be fighting in a war and dying in a war that Afghan forces are not willing to fight for themselves. We spent over a trillion dollars. We trained and equipped an Afghan military force of some 300,000 strong — incredibly well equipped — a force larger in size than the militaries of many of our NATO allies."

Biden continued: "How many more generations of America's daughters and sons would you have me send to fight Afghans — Afghanistan's civil war when Afghan troops will not? How many more lives — American lives — is it worth? How many endless rows of headstones at Arlington National Cemetery?"

Biden said, "Over the coming days, we intend to transport out thousands of American citizens who have been living and working in Afghanistan."

On Aug. 27, a suicide bomb attack at the Kabul airport killed over 100 people, including 13 Americans and over 90 Afghans, during the United States' evacuation plan. Biden's response

to the tragedy was the following, "We will hunt you down and make you pay."

The initial bombing took place at Abbey Gate; a second blast occurred outside the Baron hotel by the airport shortly after. The United States then attacked ISIS-K via airstrikes, killing three children in the process.

On Aug. 30, it was reported by the Pentagon that all U.S. troops were out of Afghanistan and back on American soil, effectively ending America's longest war. President Biden is set

to address the nation on Tuesday to clarify why the deadline to withdraw U.S. troops was not

On Aug. 31, President Biden defended his decision to evacuate U.S. troops, "My fellow Americans, the war in Afghanistan is now over," he said at the White House, in a speech broadcasted to the entire nation. Biden was under fire for his decision to leave Afghanistan without executing the full mission. His defense was vehement, as he spoke with an angered tone in regard to the criticism he received. The President explained that his decision was warranted, as the choice in Afghanistan was "between leaving and escalating" the situation, as tensions in the area were high.

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## Spectator guidelines and parking/ ticket info announced for Fall 2021 sports at Brevard College

BREVARD, N.C. – Due to the ever-changing nature of the COVID-19 pandemic, Brevard College has established revised spectator guidelines for Fall 2021 home athletic events. In addition, Brevard College has announced its ticketing and parking options for the Fall 2021 Football season.

Spectators will be permitted at outdoor sporting events in the Fall of 2021 on the campus of Brevard College. At outdoor events, spectators are encouraged to wear appropriate face coverings and follow standard public health recommendations to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Fall outdoor athletic events held at Brevard College include Cycling, Football, Men's Soccer, Women's Soccer and Tennis.

For indoor sports in the Fall of 2021, specifically Volleyball, spectators will be permitted at a capacity of 75% inside the Boshamer Gymnasium on the campus of Brevard College. Masks are required for all spectators, regardless of vaccination status, inside the Boshamer Gymnasium.

Admission is free of charge to Brevard College cycling, soccer, and tennis events. Admission for volleyball matches is \$5 per person with kids 12 and under admitted free. Brevard College students are admitted free with BC ID.

Single-game football tickets will be available on gameday, beginning when gates open two hours before kickoff. General admission tickets are \$10 for adults with kids 12 and under admitted free. Brevard College students are admitted free with BC identification. Students from visiting institutions will be admitted for \$5 with school ID.

For the first time ever with Brevard College Football now on-campus at the newly expanded Ives-Lemel Family Field, season ticket and parking packages are available for the football season. A \$150 "Field Goal Club" season pass includes two football membership passes which provides chair-back seating and admittance to the pre-game hospitality section. A \$300 "Touchdown Club" season pass includes two game day passes with chair-back seating and

hospitality admission as well as a reserved parking pass with the option of a tailgating space upgrade.

The \$500 Varsity Tornado Club membership provides members with chair-back seats and hospitality entry for four as well as a reserved parking pass with the option of a tailgating pass upgrade at home football games. In addition, Tornado Club members benefit from preferred access to all other Brevard College athletic events and special functions.

Reserved parking, including the tailgating access lot, at Brevard College home football games opens three hours before kickoff. Spots in the new tailgating parking lot must be reserved in advance exclusively through the "Touchdown Club" season pass or a Varsity Tornado Club membership. Full tailgating policies will be provided upon purchase of the tailgating spaces.

# **UCI World Mountain Bike Championships**

Beginning on Aug. 24 to Aug. 29, the UCI (Union Cycliste Internationale) Mountain Bike World Championships in Val di Sole, Trentino, Italy, took place, and a record breaking six Brevard College Cycling team student-athletes will be representing their home countries. One will be representing team USA while the other five will be representing Canada.

This will be the fourth year in a row that the cycling team will be representing Brevard College, as well as Canada and USA in the UCI.

The 6 student-athletes that are representing BC are Mazie Hayden (representing USA), Owen Clark, Tyler Clark, Rachel Pageau, Tyler Orschel and Cole Punchard (representing Canada).

BC's Senior Tyler Orschel qualified for the men's elite short track at the UCI worlds in Val di Sole, Italy and placed 28 (+1:22) racing for Canada. While later on the Freshman Cole Punchard placed first and Owen Clark placed fifth at the Swiss cup race in Basil, Switzerland.

Brevard's head cycling coach Brad Perley stated that, "Not only are these students representing their home nations, but also the BC Cycling team and Brevard College. It's always exciting to support them from afar with this year being a bit sweeter given the lack of racing in the past year and a half. They've earned this opportunity and we are very proud of each of them."

Hayden competed in the Women's Elite Downhill. She is a senior from Pittsfield, Vermont. As well as Pageau, a senior from Chicoutimi, Quebec, Canada. These two are giving it their all out there.

Orschel will compete in the Men's Elite Cross Country. As well as Tyler Clark in the U23 men's cross country as he returns as a senior for Brevard. Finally, in the Junior Men's Cross Country category, Owen Clark and Cole Punchard, both incoming Brevard College freshmen from Ontario, will race for team Canada.

For these student athletes, this is such a big accomplishment and the entire BC Nation is extremely proud of them. They should take pride in what they have accomplished and will accomplish in their future.

For the freshmen who will continue on this journey for the Tornados, as well as for the seniors who should and will take pride in what they did in their 4 to 5 years here at Brevard and they shall continue their journey in the future.


