

Brevard College Theatre presented Shakespeare's 'Comedy of Errors'

From Thursday, Dec. 18 to Sunday, Dec. 21, the Brevard College theater department put on the play "The Comedy of Errors" by William Shakespeare. "The Comedy of Errors" is one of Shakespeare's early plays that takes place in the Greek city of Ephesus. The story is about two twin brothers who were separated at birth.

After a year of nontraditional theater performances, like last year's Little Shop Horrors that was performed outside at the Brevard music Center, "The Comedy of Errors" was performed in the Black Box Theater; to enter to watch the performance, vaccination cards had to be presented at the door.

Sarah Hajkowski was asked about how it was to perform in a normal theater and she

said it,"... reminded me how unique theatre is in the fact that it happens a different way each performance." It wasn't just the performers who enjoyed being back to the black box for shows again, the audience also enjoyed watching people perform.

This 90 minute performance was beautifully done and had the audience cracking up in the end, but it was no small feat. It took lots of hours practicing.

Talley Sugg said, "the average hours worked a week as an actor was around 14-16 hours a week with that number going up a bit during tech week, but I was also designing, styling, and creating charts for every character on stage, which totaled to around 4 or 5 hours a week, bringing me to a grand total of 20 or 21 hours a week."

Sugg was asked if there is anything she would like to say about the performance and she said, "I had an incredible time working with all of these talented and dedicated people and, as a senior who's gonna be leaving the department after this school year, I'm excited to see rebel work that they continue to do, Shakespeare or otherwise."

With an almost completely full audience, the Brevard College actors pulled in the viewers and owned the nights. Everyone was happy and is eagerly awaiting the next show put on by the theater department. There is no doubt they will have the audience yearning for more.

A group of Brevard College Students walked onto campus through the bell tower last Sunday after completing a 21 day wilderness expedition in the backcountry of Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina.

Each semester, Brevard College Wilderness Leadership and Experiential Education majors and minors participate in a semester known as the Immersion Semester. The Immersion Semester involves a series of backcountry trips and various skill development courses that climaxes at a 21 day wilderness expedition that is planned completely by the students of the class, typically consisting of eight to ten students.

"You work so closely with these people, all day everyday, that you really develop a bond with them- and sometimes hate them" said current Immersion Semester student, Kendrick Austin. This close knit atmosphere was really showcased during the interview; when a question was asked, a whole slew of stories popped up from everyone in the group.

The current Immersion Semester students returned home from their 21 day expedition, which started out on the border of Tennessee and Kentucky at Big South Fork, a national river and recreation area. The group Backpacked for ten days before boarding canoes and canoeing for five days. They ended with six days of Backpacking, in which they finished out the hike by hiking back onto campus from Pisgah Forest. "It was a lot of fun, and you should ask Kendrick about how much cheese math there was," said

New COVID-19 variant emerges

Recently, a new variant of Covid-19 has begun to spread, labeled as the Omicron variant. Since this variant has just begun to emerge, scientists are working tirelessly to study its mutation. The World Health Organization has already labeled it as "a variant of concern."

Scientists in South Africa discovered the variant last week while researching a recent spike in cases. The number of cases associated with the variant are only growing, with one Portuguese citizen spreading it to thirteen people after their return from South Africa.

There is not much known about the Omicron variant. Scientists are currently researching how transmissible it is and how serious its side effects are. Their greatest concern is that people who have gotten the omicron variant have a much higher risk of reinfection than with the other variants.

According to the Associated Press, "the

variant appears to have a high number of mutations — about 30 — in the coronavirus' spike protein, which could affect how easily it spreads to people." Because of this, vaccine providers like Moderna and Pfizer may have to adapt their current vaccines to help defend against this new mutation.

It is believed that the variant might have developed in someone who suffered from covid-19 longer than average. Because this person's body could not fight off the virus for a while, this variant mutated.

Many countries have already placed travel restrictions in response to the new variant. Israel has banned all foreign entry, and Morocco has halted all international travel. The World Health Organization has encouraged countries to not enact travel bans yet but to remain cautious. The South African government spoke out against the WHO and pushed other countries to reconsider placing restrictions on travel.

Right to rescue trial in Transylvania County

On Monday the 29th, Wayne Hsiung's trial started at the Transylvania County Court house for charges dating back to 2018. Wayne Hsiung is the co-founder of a group called Direct Action Everywhere.

Direct Action Everywhere is a group of people who rescue animals from different farms and plants, and they try to expose what the farm or plant is doing to the animals. Most of the animals they rescue are animals that are later used for meat or for their skin.

In 2018, Wayne Hsiung snuck onto Sospiro Goat Ranch and "rescued" two goats from the farm. The whole thing was broadcasted on Facebook live and now Wayne is facing felony charges for breaking and entering and felony larceny. The term rescued is used lightly because he entered the ranch with no authority and stole the goats. According to the ranch, the goats were together in a very clean and highly watched stall. They were not in danger and were under the care of a veterinarian.

Sospiro Goat Ranch is located in Pisgah Forest North Carolina, and this is why the trial is being held at the Transylvania Courthouse. This goat ranch is known for raising goats then harvesting them for their meat; some agree with this process while others, like Wayne, strongly disagree with it.

The allegations against the goat ranch were that the two goats that were stolen were sick and not going to receive medical treatment and then going to die a miserable death. The goat ranch has come out with their own statements and said, "we do not mistreat or slaughter goats on our farm. Our interest is in raising strong, healthy goats."

While some people disagree with what the goat ranch does, it is very illegal to sneak onto a farm and take their animals. According to the Direct Action Everywhere webpage, you can sign a petition to support the charges being dropped against Wayne.

Wayne currently has 16 felony charges against him for taking sick animals. Whether these animals were receiving care from the farm or ranch will be up to the courts to prove. Wayne's trial will go through Thursday Dec. 2. **SPORTS**

Brevard College MLAX Sets Schedule for 2022 Season

The Brevard College men's lacrosse team, under the direction of first-year Head Coach JD LeMay, has announced its schedule for the upcoming 2022 season of competition.

"I am super excited about this upcoming season and am ready to be back out on the field competing," said Coach LeMay. "We have a challenging schedule but I believe that we have a great group of men up for the challenge. We can't wait to start our preparations for the 2022 season and our focus is on game one at home against Ferrum College on February 19."

BC's schedule consists of 14 total contests and nine total home games, which ties the most that the program has ever had. Brevard will take part in five non-conference matchups before a stretch of nine USA South Conference contests.

The Tornados will begin 2022 with fourstraight home events at Ives-Lemel Family Field, beginning on Saturday, February 19 vs. Ferrum at 2 p.m. BC will then host Oglethorpe University under-the-lights on Friday, February 25 at 7 p.m. concluding BC's two-game month of February. March begins with a pair of non-conference home tilts vs. the NAC's Husson University, who will make the trek to Brevard from Bangor, Maine for a Friday, March 11 matchup at 1 p.m. The Tornados conclude their four-game home stretch on Sunday, March 13 at 1 p.m. against Concordia Wisconsin.

USA South Conference play begins on Saturday, March 19 for the Tornados with a road trip to Montgomery, Alabama against Huntingdon College, with the first faceoff scheduled for 1 p.m. ET. Brevard then returns home for its final non-conference opponent of 2022, taking on local WNC-area institution Warren Wilson College on Wednesday, March 23 at 7 p.m.

BC jumps back into conference play on Saturday, March 26 for a morning contest against William Peace University at 10 a.m. before hitting the road to close out the month of March in Greensboro, North Carolina on Tuesday, March 29 at 7 p.m. against Greensboro College.

Brevard kicks off April with a Saturday,

April 2 meeting with Methodist University at Ives-Lemel Family Field, scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. The Tornados will then embark on a two-game road stretch in LaGrange, Georgia against LaGrange College (Saturday, April 9, 2 p.m.) and in Misenheimer, North Carolina against Pfeiffer University (Wednesday. April 13, 5 p.m.).

BC returns home on Saturday, April 16 to face Averett University at 12 p.m. before its final road trip of the regular season on Saturday, April 23, trekking to Buena Vista, Virginia to take on Southern Virginia University at 1 p.m. Brevard's final home game is scheduled for Saturday, April 30 against Piedmont University at 12 p.m.

The Tornados will be eligible for the 2022 USA South Conference Men's Lacrosse Tournament for the first time in program history in the upcoming season. The tournament begins with first-round action on Tuesday, May 3, and concludes with the semifinals and championship rounds on Friday and Saturday, May 6-7.

O'Callaghan becomes men's soccer's first All-Region Selection in DIII era

Brevard College sophomore defender Sam O'Callaghan was selected as an All-Region VI Third Team honoree by United Soccer Coaches. The honor becomes the first All-Region award for BC men's soccer in the program's NCAA DIII-era.

O'Callaghan, a native of Wicklow, Ireland, logged a pair of goals with three assists for seven points in a stellar sophomore campaign, bringing his career total to three goals and seven assists in two seasons with the Tornados. O'Callaghan scored both of his goals via penalty kick, including one that proved to be the gamewinner over Pfeiffer on September 29.

The sophomore was recently honored by the USA South Conference with All-Conference First Team and West Division First Team plaudits upon the conclusion of the Fall 2021 regular season. In Spring 2021, O'Callaghan earned West Division First Team honors in his freshman season while helping lead the Tornados to a Spring 2021 USA South West Division Tournament Championship victory.

O'Callaghan has totaled three goals and

seven assists for 13 total points in his two seasons at Brevard, starting and playing in 25 total contests.

Brevard, under the direction of Head Coach Helio "L" D'Anna, Associate Head Coach Juan Mascaro Jr., and Volunteer Assistant Coach Mario Pinto, qualified for its third-straight postseason in the Fall of 2021. BC finished its season with an impressive 9-4-3 overall record that included a 2-2-2 mark in conference play, earning the West Division's third seed in the 2021 USA South Conference Men's Soccer Tournament.
