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Brevard College has another COVID-19 outbreak

Brevard College is facing a serious COVID-19 outbreak right before winter break during finals week.

According to the Brevard College COVID-19 dashboard, there are 23 active cases on campus right now, but the number may rise or lower with time due to the number of people leaving campus and more people testing positive.

This outbreak is said to have been caused by a party held off campus on Dec. 5 that held over 100 people. The dashboard says that 21 of the 23 cases are from the cabin party.

This outbreak has set a few events back. At the pancake break Monday night, students were

required to wear masks and the event was moved outdoors. Professors have also been encouraged to move their finals online if at all possible.

Amidst the panic, there was a mistake in the emails sent about what time the COVID-19 testing was supposed to occur. Several students showed up Tuesday morning with special exceptions from their professors to be slightly late to their finals and ended up being almost forty minutes late.

A few students have also chosen not to report that they have contracted the virus, with one senior wishing to remain anonymous saying, "one of my suitemates tested positive and they said they aren't going to report it."

This also puts the next semester's plans from maskless classes at risk. Even with the current 90.73% student vaccination rate, there was still an outbreak.

Part of the cause for panic among the members of Brevard College was the lack of updates on the COVID-19 dashboard. Before Dec. 13, the last update was on Nov. 9.

If there is a chance you have been exposed to COVID-19, you should go get tested. It is better to know now then return and expose your friends and family.

The Reverend Dr. David C. Joyce, the 13th President of Brevard College, is retiring from his position as President of Brevard College on Dec. 31. This is his final interview with The Clarion.

When reflecting on the finality of retiring, Joyce said, "you look forward to the time you can do things that you've always wanted to do. But, I'm in my 26th year as a president; I have mixed feelings. I'm ready, but I'm also not ready."

Joyce will remain in Brevard and plans to come to events and remain involved with the campus as he transitions into the next journey of his life. He said that this is something he "really looks forward to."

Joyce has always called North Carolina home, and part of the reason he chose Brevard College was because of this. He was thinking in part about where he and his wife, Lynne Joyce, would want to settle down and former president Jim Davis called him and said, "is there any chance you and Lynne are ready to come home?"

Joyce said this move was "one of the best moves we ever made. For us, this was coming home." The longest place Joyce has ever continuously lived is in Brevard.

Joyce's background reflects in his leadership and he said, "my mission is to help students find their passion through higher education. I am a first generation college graduate, and because of a small college like Brevard College that welcomed me and molded me, I feel that this is the best kind of education for most people."

Joyce is a reverend that initially wanted to be in a parish and did pastor a church for two years for a small church in North Carolina. The Bishop struggled with where to appoint him, and he got an offer at Elon. Joyce took that job instead, and now feels like this is the best place for him to have ministry.

When talking about some of his favorite memories at Brevard College, Joyce said, "This college has a great history and is in a beautiful

place. I was glad to be a part of helping it grow and thrive and move in a great direction. I didn't have a part in teaching, but I was a part of building the process in how we teach."

"We have an eclectic group of students. I love the people I work with, and I love the people I serve. I love not being separated by too much administration."

The Joyce's have served more than 25 years in presidencies at three residential private liberal arts colleges including, Union College, Barbourville, KY, Ripon College, Ripon WI, and Brevard College, Brevard, NC.

Though the Reverend Dr. David C. Joyce is leaving his role as president, this is not a permanent goodbye. After 11 years of service, things must continue to move forward and grow in new ways. We send the Joyce's our best wishes in this new era of life, and we hope to see them again at Brevard College events.
