Brevard College Theater has just finished their final production of the season, the musical "Next to Normal," and it has wowed audiences. The musical, whose book and lyrics were written by Brian Yorkey and music by Tom Kitt, was codirected by BC theatre professors Abbey Toot and Andrea Boccanfuso.

"Next to Normal" follows a mother struggling with worsening bipolar disorder and the effects that managing her illness has on her husband and daughter. The musical addresses grief, depression, suicide, drug abuse, ethics in modern psychiatry and the underbelly of suburban life through its rock styled music.

The set was a whimsical design with many levels including lofts, steps, and a spiral staircase. It was a unique use of the entire space. They also used a blue and purple color scheme that brought the entire set, props included, together.

The musical also included a live band. There were multiple standout performers, but two that


really took on the challenge of these roles were Talley Sugg and Kristian Michels.

The mother, Diana Goodman, was portrayed by Talley Sugg. Her portrayal of Diana encapsulated the struggle and reality of Diana's life in an authentic and genuine way that was respectful to those affected by bipolar disorder. Her wide range of both vocals and emotion reeled the audience in and left them stunned.

The father, Dan Goodman, was performed by Kristian Michels. Michels portrayed the ever constant yet complexly tired man in a way that captured Dan and brought together the idea of the family both Diana and Dan had created.

The other cast members are worth celebrating, such as Eli Hughes in their eerie portrayal of Gabe, Scott Douglas as the musical romantic Henry, Naomi Firebaugh as Natalie, the overworked and trying to find herself daughter, and Dr. Madden the doctor and rockstar played by Jamie Gilson.

This performance was nothing less than stellar and everything you would expect from Brevard College Theatre.

There's a time-honored old saying that goes like this, "If you want something done, give it to someone who's busy." Matthew Brethen is, and has been for much of his life, the epitome of that old saying.

The Class of 2020 BORG major successfully kept many more balls in the air than most while a student at BC, playing soccer for four years, garnering numerous academic awards and scholarships and graduating Magna Cum Laude with a 3.8 GPA.

He worked in various jobs as a grocery associate at Food Lion in his Huntersville home town from 2017 until about a year ago. Bent on a career in public service, and following graduation, he was waiting for his dream job, acceptance into the Peace Corps.

When COVID blind-sided America, shutting down Peace Corps operations worldwide, Matt accepted a year-long assignment with

We do not publish letters whose authorship cannot be verified. the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which partners with AmeriCorps in offering a unique team-based service program that gives 18–24-year-olds the opportunity to serve communities rocked by disasters like floods, hurricanes, tornadoes or, yes, pandemics like COVID-19.

"My FEMA Corps experience was really interesting," Brethen said. "It gave me the chance to see places and things that I wouldn't normally see and to help people who were in real need. I now understand what folks face when disaster strikes, as well as how the many state and federal agencies designed to help them operate."

Matt's FEMA Corps team assignments took him first to Philadelphia, then Utica in upstate

N.Y., then to exotic New Orleans, then Atlanta, and finally to his last stop in Kansas City. In his 12 months with FEMA, he did everything from register dazed disaster survivors to distribute water and flood clean-up kits to work in daily operations that facilitated more than 84,000 COVID vaccinations in Philadelphia.

Brethen's FEMA experience will stand him in good stead as he steadily moves toward his goal of a career in public service. Law school may be in his future, but he's now been offered a position with FEMA and is also considering another possibility with the State of North Carolina.

many times they were inspired by Lake Michigan and Chicago in their poetry. They also brought up the fact that they were inspired by the ocean and LA when they lived there, but in a different manner. Currently, they live in Pittsburgh, which is where they have been for the last seven years.

Corfman is working on their next book, but it is stalled. The main difference between this next book and their previously written work is that the poems in the next one will have titles.

Corfman's first book was about them having an identical twin. Their twin is now a lawyer in Chicago. Corfman said it was weird and made them question their gender because of how biologically similar twins are.

When Corfman isn't thinking about writing ideas or actively writing, they can be found listening to music, reading a book, hanging out with friends or watching TV. Also, they are most known for being a chatty extrovert who likes to have meaningful conversations. Something unique about Corfman is that they write and zoom from a round room which gives their writing "round room energy."


Corfman says they are currently reading "Generations", a memoir about Lucille Clifton.
