Before that point, the Nados have work to put in. For most teams, including Brevard, this work begins in the Spring.

Brevard is coming off of a season that most would consider to be good. The Nados finished with six wins and four losses, including some dominant outings like last November against Averett

However, for the Tornados, this was considered a disappointing season. This is due to the championship standard instilled program-wide from Head Coach Bill Khayat and his staff.

The team is prepared to move past last season, and look towards dominating this upcoming fall.

This turning of the page began on March 21st. Four weeks of laborious Spring Ball began on that morning, bright and early at 6:00 a.m. in the morning.

The following four weeks were filled with practices that the team viewed as opportunities to get better.

With Khayat away, serving as the assistant Head coach for the Pittsburgh Maulers of the USFL, the responsibilities of the Head Coach fell on the shoulders of the assistants, including newly-promoted Defensive Coordinator Shane Nelson.

Nelson served as the Nado Inside Linebackers coach the past three seasons, as well as the Strength and Conditioning Coach.

Nelson takes over a defense that has set numerous records throughout the Khayat regime, and looks to continue its domination of the USA South.

Practices concluded this past Thursday, and

now the players will shift their focus to getting better on their own through the Summer, before reporting in August for Fall Camp.

Game one of the 2022 season will take place at Brevard's Ives-Lemel Family Field on September 3rd.

How to study for finals

With exams right around the corner, you may be stressed and burnt out. These are some tips to help you keep focused and know what you need to know by the time

Don't just study a single topic from one class. Study lots of different material from the same class in one sitting; this helps prepare you to solve different sets of questions in different orders and better prepares you for tests.

Make a plan of when you're going to study for what and stick to it. This makes sure you have time to learn exactly what you need to.

Get actual sleep. If you don't know it by midnight, you're probably not going to know at all. Sleep is critical for turning short-term memory into something long term and applicable.

Eliminate distractions before you start studying. Gather everything you need, and go somewhere that brings you enough peace to focus.

Get actual sleep. If you don't know it by midnight, you're probably not going to be able to cram it in. Sleep is critical for turning short-term memory into something long term.

Different methods of studying are going to work best for different people, so it's okay if some of these don't work for you. Just remember to avoid cramming!
