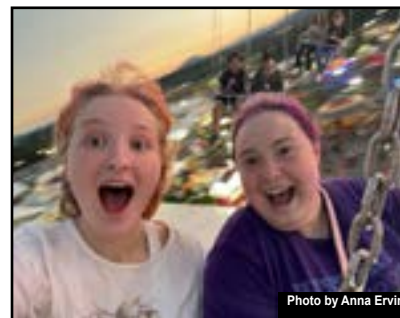

Q&A: Interviewing BC's Red Maple Tree about the Fall!

For this extra-special Campus Q&A, Clarion consulted the Red Maple, or *acer rubrum*, residing outside Jones Library, which has been noticed by many for its eagerness to turn color in anticipation of autumn and winter.

Q. What is your name, year, and major(s) at Brevard College?

A. Please, call me Ruby. *Acer Rubrum* was my father. I've lived an estimated 25+ years as I was

dedicated to Brevard's late Professor Emerita of Mathematics, Rachel Cathey Daniels. That makes me a super super senior, I'd guess. I major in dendrology and color change.

Q. How long has your species lived on United States soil?

A. The prestigious Rubrum family have had roots in this country since the mid 1600s or so. Thankfully, we have since been cultivated for more than woodworking and recognized as the extraordinary beauties we are.

With that being said, autumn in say, St. Paul is significantly colder than in Brevard—Fall is different for everyone! Given the lineage of Red Maples in western North Carolina however, we're pretty adaptable, and the autumn is now just another bump on the log.

Q. Now for the big question for many of our readers, why do you seem to be changing early this season?

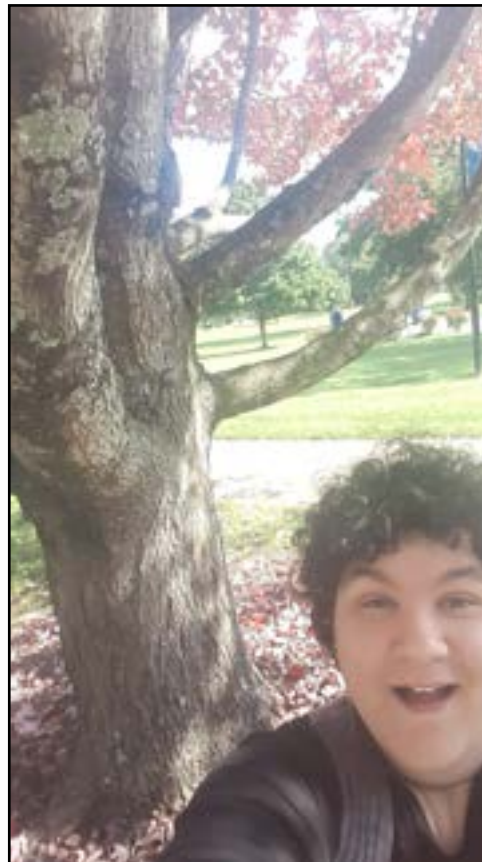

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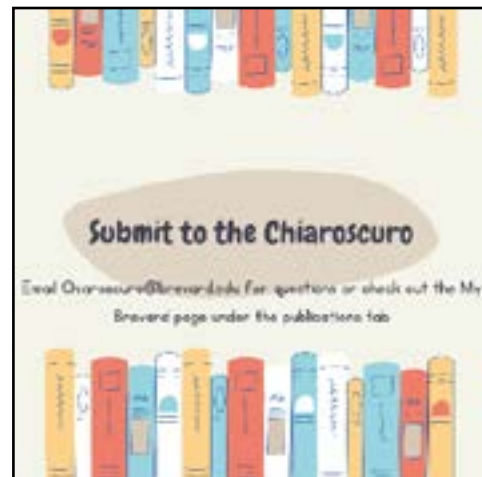
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Faculty Profile

Believe it or not, before Alviani came to Brevard College to teach, she had only been in North Carolina once and that was her driving through to go to Charleston, South Carolina. Alviani had a very unique life before she came to Brevard College to teach.

Alviani got her Associates in Specialized Technology at Oakbridge Academy of Arts in Lower Burrell, Pennsylvania. Once she finished she went to get a Bachelor's degree at Clarion University in Clarion, Pennsylvania.

After she finished her degrees she decided to go into the Peace Corps. She was placed

in Ghana to teach art at a school for the deaf. While teaching in this position she learned how to speak sign language in the native language for Ghana. She can do a bit of American Sign Language (ASL) but she knows Ghanaian Sign Language better.

Alviani spent 18 months in Ghana and fell in love with teaching. She had to come back early since she became sick, but once she took the time to recover she took a job as an ecommerce graphic designer. After relaxing, she realized just how much she missed teaching, so she went for a Master's in Digital Art at Bowling Green State University.

After Alviani graduated from Bowling Green, she taught as an adjunct there for a bit before applying for jobs elsewhere. That is where she got the job at Brevard College. She says that teaching at Brevard College is very

different than teaching at Bowling Green State University as Brevard is much smaller.

Alviani loves the mountains and she is enjoying teaching at Brevard College. Her first time seeing Brevard was when she came for her in-person interview. Now Alviani is enjoying life teaching at Brevard College.

Besides being a teacher Alviani considers herself a lens based artist. She knows Adobe programs and works a camera very well. Just like many artists, she likes to look at others' work for inspiration, and when asked what three artists she recommends, she named Lynsey Addario, Cindy Sherman and Kei Ito.

Rebekah Alviani loves teaching others about art and is very excited to be at Brevard College. It is clear that she loves her job and will be putting her heart and soul into teaching here at the College.

Third win in a row. Brevard men's soccer team celebrates two away wins against Warren Wilson and Centre College.

Already on Sept. 14 the team of Coach L D'Anna met the team of Warren Wilson. The search for the right formation seems to be over. For the second game in a row, the Tornados' coach had them play a 442.

The superior number in the midfield gave the Tornados the necessary security to control the opponent from Swannanoa, NC. The early stages thus belonged to the soccer team from Brevard and were rewarded with some very good opportunities.

However, the goal to make it 1-0 came after a counterattack situation. Brevard won the ball in their own half and counterattacked with lightning speed. Igor da Silva played the long pass to Ryan Lynch, who after dribbling ice-coldly pushed the ball past the goalkeeper.

After that, the Tornados left the game to the hosts. To make matters worse, goalkeeper Matheus Rossi caused a penalty, bringing

Warren Wilson back to 1-1. The break did the Tornados good. They were able to collect themselves and they discussed how to get back to the first fifteen minutes of the game.

Promptly followed the 2-1 lead of BC men's Soccer. In the 44th minute another long ball to Ryan Lynch. This time, however, he did not finish the ball himself, but set the scene for his strike partner Luis dos Santos. The latter then had an easy game and only had to push the ball past the goalkeeper.

After a spectacular free kick, the Tornados could increase the lead to 3-1. Again, the scorer was Ryan Lynch. The game seemed to be decided. However, the BC soccer team let up again and had to accept the 3-2 connecting goal after an individual mistake by the defense. The game was again exciting for a short moment. After 90 minutes, however, the deserved winner was Brevard.

So the Tornados went confidently on the road to Kentucky. There, the fifth consecutive away game awaited on Sep. 17 against Centre

College.

Coach L's team expected a very strong opponent. But the opening phase belonged again to the Tornados. However, they were unable to create any scoring opportunities. The renewed superiority brought the BC soccer team a lot of possession, but the final pass to the two strikers did not succeed. After a few highlights, it went into the break with 0-0.

Without highlights, the game continued in the Kentucky heat. Redemption for BC came from Luis dos Santos, who headed in the decisive goal to win 1-0 in the seventy-sixth minute. Although the final offensive of Centre College again put the Tornados under pressure. However, no dangerous chances came at the end of the goal. 1-0 was in the end and the third victory in a row on the road was achieved.

The BC Tornados men's soccer are now looking forward to their first home game of the season. On Sept. 21 they will play Berea College at 5 p.m.
