BC offers new housing opportunities for upperclassmen

Pre-Registration for Fall 2024 is happening next week (March 25th-29th) This is such an important week! You MUST be registered for classes in order to select your housing.

Once you have registered, you will be able to select where you want to live. We will be holding Housing Selection in Tornado Alley (located in Coltrane). You will need to show proof of your class schedule, GPA and class year (you should be able to pull all this up on my brevard or BC Radar).

Special housing opportunities will be offered in North Villages 1 & 2 and South 7 & 8. Please look below for more information on these opportunities.

NEW Housing Opportunities

For Seniors Only, South 7 & 8: This year we will be offering couple housing in South 7 & 8. If you and your significant other would like to room together, this will be offered to you for housing. We will require whoever pays for your schooling to send an email to housing agreeing to the arrangement.

Gender Inclusive Housing North Village 1 & 2 (any upperclassmen): Gender Inclusive Housing (GIH) is a housing option in which two or more students share a corridor style bedroom, suite, and/or apartment regardless of the students' sex, gender identity or gender expression. In other words, this option allows for students of any gender identity to live together regardless of sex assigned at birth. This option will be available for anyone who chooses and can accommodate LGBTQA+, or individuals who just feel more comfortable outside traditional gender identities. Attached is

Graduate Housing and older students (<23 years old): Housing will be located at Brevard Music Center. You can attend Housing Selection on any of the days.

Tuesday, April 2 - Rising Seniors by GPA (you must be classified by hours):

8am - 10am - 3.5 or higher 10:15am-Noon - 3.0 or higher 1-3pm - less than 3.0

Wednesday, April 3 - Rising Juniors by GPA (you must be classified by hours):

8am - 10am - 3.5 or higher 110:15am- Noon - 3.0 or higher 1-3pm - less than 3.0

Thursday, April 4 - Rising Sophomores by GPA (you must be classified by hours):

8am - 10am - 3.5 or higher 10:15am-Noon - 3.0 or higher 1-3pm - less than 3.0

FAQ's:

Do I have to show proof of GPA: Yes

Can I live with an upperclassmen: Yes. The upperclassmen will need to choose first and inform Housing who they want living with them (you can attend with them).

Can I sign up with a group: Yes. The upperclassmen will need to sign up everyone (you can attend with them). A group is considered a suite, so only 4 people can be chosen.

Can returners live in Beam: NO. Beam and East Jones are reserved for First-Year students.

Coming in at the number one spot, Kirk Cousins signed with the Atlanta Falcons on a four-year deal. During the 2023-24 season Cousins had an achilles injury and has worked to get back into training. They were able to spread the ball to Atlanta's star players on offense, players like Bijan Robbinson, Kyle Pitts, Drake London, newly acquired Darnnel Mooney and Rondel Moore.

Number two, Russel Willson was on a massive

contract from the Denver Broncos. Instead of the Steelers paying him 40 million a year to play for them, they pay the veteran minimum of 1.2 million, and Denver pays 38.8 of the remaining salary.

Movie Review:

'Damsel' (2024) featuring Millie Bobby Brown

Netflix's new movie Damsel, released in 2024, is an action packed fantasy starring Millie Bobby Brown as the lead alongside Angela Bassett, Robin Wright, Ray Winstone, Nick Robinson, and Brooke Carter.

"There are many stories of chivalry where the heroic knight saves the damsel in distress. This is not one of them." That is how Brown's new fantasy film begins, so out the gate we know there will be a damsel, she will be in distress, and she will be in charge of getting herself out of it.

After a quick prologue, with some backstory of knights facing a fire-breathing dragon, we are introduced to Elodie (Brown) centuries after the prologue who is a princess of a snowy remote land that is facing dire circumstances. She along with her sister Floria (Brooke Carter) are selling the drapes and other goods in their castle in order to get food and fire wood for their subjects.

A messenger later arrives with a letter enclosed with a royal seal that contains a proposal from a queen of a faraway land asking for Elodie to become the bride of her son, the prince, and in return it will restore their land to its former prosperity. Elodie is reluctant but will do anything in her power to help her people.

Upon arriving at the warm and luxurious kingdom of the queen, played by Robin Wright, Elodie and Floria are charmed by all the kingdom's excentrics. Later in an attempt to further fuse their families Elodie's stepmother, Lady Bayford played by Angela Bassett, seeks a friendship with the queen but is refused and talked down to by the queen. This foreshadows the queen and her kingdom's true intentions.

The wedding goes through without a hitch, even though Lady Bayford had overwhelming concern that something is wrong. The production design by Patrick Tatopoulos and costumes by Amanda Monk are breathtaking and the transformation from this tomboy princess to an elegant princess is not the usual. There are hidden details throughout that scene that would be revealed later on throughout the movie.

Following the wedding Elodie and her new husband enter a strange ceremony near the mouth of a cave in the mountains where there are many masked courtiers. The new couple perform in a ceremony that mixes their blood now making Elodie a true royal in her new family. Turns out her new husband and his family have planned to sacrifice Elodie to the dragon inside the cavern which is part of a centuries-old arrangement that keeps the dragon at bay, preventing it from preying on the kingdom.

Once Elodie is tossed down into the cavern we switch from a Cinderella story to a Die Hard adventure where she has to try and escape the dragon. The dragon is voiced by Shohreh Aghdashloo who is perfectly casted in order to give that smokey voice. The dress with hidden tricks from earlier comes around to play a role because it turns out to be Elodies survival kit.

Elodie manufactures a dagger by taking her corset busk, which is stuck down the bodice, and scrapes it across the cavern wall in order to sharpen it. She also uses some of the fabric as protection and rips it off to give her more freedom of movement. Upon searching through the caves she stumbles upon a few dead bodies of other princess who came before her and it dawned on her that this wedding ceremony that she went though goes back far before her time. There is a

wall in the cave that is covered with their names written as they longed to escape.

The back half of the film plays out like a video game with Elodie facing one obstacle after another while making some progress but not enough to save herself. She is filled with determination and pure adrenaline as she attempts to escape. There are some scary surprises that fall upon her especially as other characters arrive in the cave.

There is a fresh feeling in the air with a female take on the traditional tale including a bit of a sisterhood-is-powerful twist near the end which makes it worth a watch. This film hooks you in from the beginning and never lets you go. I think this is a great twist on the traditional damsel in distress trope along with amazing acting to go along with it. Overall, I think this movie is worth the watch and definitely deserves a chance.

Finally comes the most controversial illusion of American freedom: democracy. In what seems like the pinnacle of American ideals, the illusion of choice reigns supreme, hiding the true influence money and power have over the voices of the people. Voting every couple of years and then remaining silent until the next election isn't what democracy is about. But with people ignoring these parts, the domination of special interests and lobbying groups undermines the voice of the people, reducing democracy to a mere facade for oligarchy.

It is not easy to see that America's illusions are shattered by the truth. The land of the free is not an immutable reality but a lofty aspiration that demands constant reinforcement and introspection. True freedom requires more than patriotic statements; it demands a commitment to justice, equality and the solid pursuit of a more perfect union. Only by acknowledging and addressing the challenges that beset America can Americans hope to realize the promise of freedom for all.
