Brevard College will host its second annual Sidewalk Art Competition on Saturday, April 27 from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. in Robbins Plaza (the courtyard outside of Myers Dining Hall).

The festival is free to the public. Sidewalk art will feature college and high school students. There will also be live music, llamas, a kid's chalk play area, cornhole and other fun activities.

The competition is open to all Brevard College students, as well as local high school students, and the public is encouraged to stop by to watch the live drawings and admire the finished products. Participants submit their ideas in advance and are approved by Visual Arts faculty members in order to compete. Each age group is eligible to win a total of \$500 in cash rewards and gift certificates to BC Outfitters, the Brevard College gear shop.

Contest rules dictate that each drawing must remain within the designated square area and that no spray fixatives may be used. In addition to chalk distributed by Brevard College, participants may bring their own sidewalk chalk. All materials must be temporary and washable with soap and water. College students and high school students will not compete with each other.

"This event is a great opportunity for our art students to show off their art skills free to the public," said organizer and faculty member Sean Parrish.

Parrish said he was inspired by a sidewalk art competition that takes place in Savannah, Georgia. "The best part of the day is really having the community gather on campus to observe the art being made in a festival atmosphere."

Brevard College Theatre will present two nights of Student Projects on April 28 and 29 at 7 p.m. They will include a Cabaret in the Francis Pavilion Lobby of the Porter Center, followed by a One-Act Play in the Morrison Playhouse. The program will also present "Mixtape," an evening of student work on April 30 at 7 p.m. in the Morrison Playhouse at the Paul Porter Center for Performing Arts.

The April 28 & 29 Cabaret is "Good Girls Don't Make History," an evening of songs that takes us on a musical journey exploring women in popular culture. It features Anna Ervin, Naomi Firebaugh and Lyric Contarino.

Following the Cabaret, the performance will move to the Morrison Playhouse Black Box for "Monsters are Made in the Minds of Men," directed by Sierethene Chepes. This one-act play bounces between the past and present to explore themes of mental health, the generational ripple effect of trauma, and the destructive impact of obsession (npx.org). It features Grace Dempsey, Eli Hughes and Jodi Wyse with Roxxie Petryshak as Stage Manager.

Then, on April 30 at 7 p.m. in the Morrison Playhouse Black Box, there will be presentations from Brevard College Theatre's Movement Class, Senior Capstone Presentations, and artifacts from the Design/Tech classes on display.

Brevard College Theatre is a company who prioritizes collaboration and



the exploration of Theatre Arts as a means of communication and social action. Within the College mission of experiential learning, faculty and staff strive to present students with authentic and meaningful experiences representative of real-world production and performance in the theatre industry. Play Review

'Macbeth' ascends to new heights (literally)

William Shakespeare's "Macbeth" is, to borrow a line from another Shakespeare play, such stuff that dreams are made on—or perhaps more aptly, nightmares.

One of Shakespeare's best and darkest tragedies, it tells the story of a Scottish thane in the midst of civil war who is told he would become king, but to make that happen, he must resort to murder. Urging him on is his wife, who chides him at first for his reluctance to do what is needed, but as her husband sinks deeper and deeper into evil, she ultimately cannot live with what they have done.

It is a familiar text, often taught in high school, which features witches, ghosts, sword-fighting, and multiple gruesome on-stage murders, and which is riddled throughout with some of Shake-speare's most well-remembered lines, including the iconic (and often misquoted) "Double, double, toil and trouble / Fire burn and cauldron bubble." Indeed, the play's many set pieces—the opening with the Weird Sisters, the "dagger" scene, and the so-called "porter" scene, for instance—are so familiar that any production must strive to prevent them becoming cliche.

Fortunately, BC Theatre's production of Shakespeare's "Scottish play," which opened last night and continues through Sunday, avoids such pitfalls, offering a fresh and innovative approach to these and many other scenes in the play. In the aforementioned "Double, double" scene, for instance, delivery of the refrain lines is slowed down to avoid a sing-songy effect, which in turn enhances the incantation that is the scene's intent.

Shakespeare's incredible poetry is of course everywhere in this production, but it is frequently improved upon by clever staging, costuming and props. One particularly creepy scene, when Macbeth sees Banquo's ghost while hosting a dinner with guests, for instance, combines a mesmerizing gaze from the ghost (played by Camile Bonnin) and a close, almost claustrophobic staging with Macbeth's throne and two dinner tables.

This level of theatricality is evident even before the famous opening lines of the play—prior to the witches saying, "When shall we three meet again?," we are afforded a glimpse into the story to come, and the witches' part in it, with all of the cast on stage and some slow-motion swordplay.

The seven-person cast is outstanding, with most actors playing multiple roles. The title character is played with great aplomb by Taylor Sparrow, while his cunning and overly ambitious wife is performed superbly by Anna Ervin. Lady Macbeth's sleepwalking scene is one of the high points in the play, and Ervin plays it to perfection. Sparrow, meanwhile, skillfully delivers some

of Shakespeare's greatest verse, including the "Tomorrow and tomorrow" soliloquy about "a tale / Told by an idiot, full of sound and fury / Signifying nothing."

The "weird sisters" in this production are played by a single actor, Lyric Contarino, who dons a three-faced mask for the opening scene and then performs all three parts. She also plays Seyton and the drunken porter in one of the most welcome bits of comic relief in all of Shakespeare, coming immediately after the sustained tension of the murder plot by Macbeth and Lady Macbeth.

Rounding out the cast are Nell O'Brien, who plays the key roles of Duncan and Macduff as well as one of the murderers, Abby Reeves as Ross, and Amelia Payne as Malcolm and 1st Murderer.

Worth noting too is the set design. Dominating the stage is a "mountain" that the characters frequently traverse, a steep and textured incline which serves the multiple purposes of elevating (and isolating) Macbeth and other characters at key points in the story and escalating the tension of what is already a very tense tragedy.

The mountain also helps to epitomize what director Dan Toot says in the program was a key question the cast and crew wrestled with in this production: "What happens when Human nature comes into conflict with a force of nature?" For the most part in this production, characters deal with the mountain by going around it, especially entering or exiting a scene, but they often must tread upon its lower or middle heights, and in several key scenes, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth are at the very top of the mountain, making their (literal and figurative) descent all the more palpable and profound

This production is the final mainstage production by BC Theatre for the 2023-2024 academic year, and it is in many ways a fitting and appropriate conclusion to an excellent season of shows. It perfectly captures Shakespeare's horror of ambition gone too far while simultaneously showcasing the numerous talents by both cast and crew at Brevard College.

Tornados win big on Graduate Day

BC earns 8-1 conference victory on day celebrating Brooke Garland

The Brevard College women's tennis team (8-6, 4-3 USA South) defeated Salem College (5-9, 2-5 USAS) 8-1 on Tuesday afternoon in a USA South Conference matchup at the McCoy Tennis Complex.

The victory came on Graduate Day as graduate student Brooke Garland was honored for her contributions as a Brevard College student-athlete.

Garland teamed with her longtime doubles partner Sophie Trantham and promptly won 8-0 in number two doubles. Jada Ore and Madison Bowen did not drop a game themselves in number three doubles to give the Tornados a 2-0 lead early on.

In number one doubles, BC's Hannah Hersh and Gracie Spangler battled to an 8-4 victory over Adley Keim and Mariana Faint to complete a Brevard sweep in doubles play.

Garland continued her big day with a win in number four singles, not losing a game in the 6-0, 3-0 (retired) result. Hersh (no. 1), Bowen (no. 3), Trantham (no. 5) and Ore (no. 6) all won in straight sets in singles as well. Similar to her doubles partner, Trantham did not drop a game in her match en route to a 6-0, 6-0 victory.

The afternoon began with a pre-match Graduate Day ceremony honoring Garland, a native of Canton, North Carolina who will be graduating with a Master of Science degree in Health and Human Performance with a concentration in Coaching from Brevard College.

Garland has received numerous honors throughout her career at BC, including the Presidential Award for Scholarship in 2023, the BC Perfect Storm Award in 2023, and the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship award, while being named to the USA South All-Sportsmanship Team three times. Academically, she earned the Highest GPA Award in the Exercise Science Program for all four years during her undergraduate career to go along with the Outstanding Health and Human Performance Student award in 2023.

The Brevard College women's tennis team will conclude its regular season at home on Saturday with a USA South Conference match vs. Southern Virginia. Women's soccer 2023-24 season comes to an end

The 2023-24 women's soccer season is now in the book. After the Alumni game, they have concluded their spring season and will now focus on the upcoming 2024 Fall Season. However, this 2023-24 season won't be forgotten, as it was a historic campaign for the 2023 Brevard College women's soccer team.

A record-breaking fall season saw the Tornados get 13 wins, three ties, and only five losses. They had 14 shutouts, thanks to our goalkeepers Nico Arroyo, Abby Nunez and Mckenzie Lozano. But the defense wasn't the only outstanding part of this team, as the offense scored 52 goals throughout the season. A solid attack and defense made this team end third in the USA South Standings.

And this team showed their skills in the USA South Tournament when it mattered the most. Starting the first round against #6 Meredith, the Tornados had a hard time trying to score a goal, but a solid defense with Nico Arroyo in goal would see the game head into penalties. A substitution in goal would see Abby Nunez go in goal for Nico Arroyo, ready to show how a freshman can handle the pressure of her first USA South Tournament appearance. Nunez would go on to save a penalty and score another one, allowing Rachael Trifoli to score the winning penalty to win the penalty shootout 4-2, sending the Tornados to the USA South Semifinal, and giving Brevard their first postseason victory in the NCAA era.

Next, they would have to face the Methodist Monarchs. They would have to write history, as they had never made it to the USA South Championship and have only defeated Methodist once, all the way back in 2017. The game wouldn't be easy, but this team was made for games like this. Halfway through the first half, freshman Austin Huffman scored the first goal of the game, giving the Tornados a slight advantage to take control of the game. As the second half began, Tae Brown scored another goal, doubling the advantage and getting closer to the championship. Although Methodist tried to score a goal to shorten the distance, Brevard's defense was rock solid, and Nico Arroyo got her eighth shutout of the season. The Tornados beat Methodist for the second time in history and headed into their first-ever USA South Championship!

Southern Virginia was their opponent, and the Nados hopied to get their first conference title. The first half would see both sides creating chances to score, but solid defenses wouldn't allow the scoreboard to change. Southern Virginia scored first in the second half, but Taylor Richardson would quickly score for the Tornados to get back in the game. Unfortunately, two more goals from Southern Virginia would see the Knights ending

the night with the trophy.

For the spring season, Brevard hosted a 9v9 mini tournament, in which the Tornados won their four matches, showing how strong this team looked ahead of the fall season. Their season ended with a 4-2 win against the Alumni team, to conclude what has been the best NCAA season for the Brevard women's soccer team.

Senior forward Grace Black led the way with an All-Conference Second Team selection, and freshman duo midfielder Austin Huffman and defender MK Smoak received All-Conference Honorable Mention honors. Junior midfielder Hayley Kenney represented Brevard on the All-Sportsmanship Team. Channing Barker, Grace Black, Hailey Brien, Hayley Kenney, Kiara Porcelli and Autumn Wright were all named to the Academic All-District team.

Taylor Richardson got her first Player of the Week award. Goalkeepers Nico Arroyo and Abby Nunez ended the season with a couple of USA South Defender of the Week awards, and Austin Huffman would win Rookie of the Week on the last game of the regular season.

Brevard's historic season included the program's single-season NCAA-era record for wins (13), the first unbeaten season in program NCAA history (8-0-2), and the first time that any BC women's soccer team has advanced out of the first round of a conference tournament and also the program's first NCAA-era postseason win.
