The BC Class of 2024

Nearly 200 graduates receive diplomas in largest graduating class in Brevard's history

Commencement weekend 2024 at Brevard College was an unusually colorful occurrence, even in the heavens.

On Friday night, a few hours after graduates were "hooded" with colorful regalia representing their fields of study, the skies above Brevard put on a show of aurora borealis, the so-called "northern lights." The phenomenon, a rare treat this far south, was caused by coronal mass ejections on the sun, which prompted NOAA's Space Weather Prediction Center to issue a severe (G4) geomagnetic storm watch for the first time in nearly 20 years.

Fortunately, here on Earth (and in Transylvania County), the weather was much nicer, as blue skies and mild temperatures greeted graduates and their families and friends Saturday morning, May 11, as Brevard College held its annual Commencement Exercises. With 193 graduates, 14 of them earning a master's degree, it was the largest graduating class in the history of the college.

"Graduates, you've made it. For years you've been working with this day in mind—this is the moment where we celebrate all of your determination

and hard work. We celebrate your attainment of a noble goal," said Dr. Bradley J Andrews, president of Brevard College, in his opening address.

The festivities began with a traditional Baccalaureate & Hooding Ceremony held on Friday afternoon, May 10, in the Porter Center for Performing Arts. The graduation ceremony on Saturday morning took place on the Ives-Lemel Family Field. Both events were live-streamed, allowing family members and friends to enjoy the events from afar. President Andrews welcomed everyone and then the campus minister, The Rev. Dr. Sharad H. Creasman, gave an invocation to open the proceedings. Chair of the Board of Trustees, Heath Weldon '75, offered greetings from the Board, followed by the announcement of Honors

and Awards by Vice President for Academic Affairs & Dean of Faculty Jennifer Frick-Ruppert.

Three students received the Presidential Award for Distinction: Anna Ervin, Grace Dempsey and Lena Hatter. The award recognizes graduates who demonstrate remarkable leadership, service, and academic achievement.

Graduate Bunny Frost was honored with the C. Edward and Brona N. Roy Good Citizenship Award for exhibiting a record of moral character, citizenship, leadership, and a positive influence on campus.

Julia Lusk and Sydney Raber each earned the Presidential Award for Scholarship, which honors the graduating seniors with at least 62 hours of coursework at Brevard College with the highest academic rank, based on the cumulative grade point average for all coursework completed.

"We graduated our first class, on this campus, in 1934," President Andrews said. "One thing they all have in common is a commitment to Brevard's motto: 'Learn in Order to Serve.' We know you will take the spirit of service with you to enrich the communities in which you will live and work."

Unlike many colleges who invite a well-known guest to speak at the ceremony, Brevard College engages its students in the process and encourages personal growth by choosing two outstanding seniors to speak at Commencement. Graduating seniors Lena Hatter and Ish Parsons delivered thoughtful and heartfelt commencement speeches, encouraging their fellow graduates to be proud of overcoming obstacles due to COVID-19, which marked the start of their college careers.

"The adversities we have faced as a class are a testament to our strength and determination to make it to this day," Hatter said. "Let's embrace the future ahead with the same optimism and enthusiasm as when we took off our masks."

Following the awards and speeches, graduates walked across the stage to receive their diplomas from President Andrews. More than 30 of the newly minted graduates hail from Western North Carolina, while the rest traveled from 16 states and 5 foreign countries to make Brevard their home as they pursued their educational goals.

To conclude the ceremony, President Andrews offered a charge to the graduating class, followed by the traditional Brevard College hymn "Guarded Well By Mountains" led by Tamara Kuykendall. Graduates and faculty processed in and out to bagpipe music, a tradition at BC.

"For the class of 2024, what will the future hold?," Andrews said in his closing remarks. "We are excited to see how each one of you answers that question for yourself. Keep in touch with your mentors as you navigate your next steps and beyond. We are here to support you and we will always be eager to acknowledge your achievements."











Two Brevard College students have received scholarships to attend a national student leadership conference this summer.

Chloe Banner '25 and Kylee Draper '26 will both attend the American Association of University Women's National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) May 30-June 1 in Washington, D.C. Banner and Draper are both members of the Institute for Women in Leadership (IWIL) program at the college.

IWIL is a co-curricular learning program that helps women gain confidence in their leadership abilities by providing opportunities through service learning programs. IWIL embodies the College's motto, "Learn in Order to Serve," through service projects on and off campus.

"This is an amazing accomplishment for these two students," said Katherine Parnell, who has served as chair for IWIL since 2022. "The mission of the NCCWSL conference aligns perfectly with our goals in IWIL. The leadership skills and insight that Chloe and Kylee will bring back will be such a resource for their peers."

Voice of the Rivers exploring the Cape Fear River watershed

On Monday, May 13, the Voice of the Rivers team departed from Brevard College for the Cape Fear River watershed.

This team, led by BC faculty members Jenny Kafsky and Stacy Workman, are paddling to the sea in canoes and kayaks, ending their nearly three-week journey at the Atlantic Ocean near Wilmington, North Carolina.

Voice of the Rivers (VOR) has a long history at Brevard College, with students participating in interdisciplinary "Learning in Community" courses along a river since 1997. These trips offer students the traditional 6 academic credit hours they earn in a LINC course, with the addition of spending 18 days learning and living together while exploring a watershed.

On the first VOR, the team started on the French Broad River and over the course of a semester paddled the Tennessee, Ohio and Mississippi rivers before finishing downstream of New Orleans in the Gulf of Mexico.

Since then, VOR teams have paddled the Broad /Congaree/Santee/Cooper, Yadkin-Peedee, Savannah, Sewannee, and many other rivers, including the Rio Santa Cruz and Rio Negro in Patagonia.

Writers from as far away as Oregon and as close as Brevard gathered May 16-19 for this year's Looking Glass Rock Writers' Conference, an an-


nual event co-sponsored by the college and the Transylvania County Library Foundation. Exploring the theme "a sense of place," confer-

Let's get tricky

Academic perspective

There are many terms in the English language that are used interchangeably, such as *argue*, *debate* and *discuss*. Even as an English student, I couldn't explain the distinction. Until now! The English language is a tricky language, and I love to explain nuances.

According to the Webster Dictionary:

"Argue: to persuade by giving reasons."

"Debate: to argue about b) to engage (an opponent) in debate."

"Discuss: to present in detail for examination or consideration."

What is complicated about trying to understand the difference between these three verbs is that they each need context that definitions do not supply. Each of these terms has multiple senses and subsenses. *Debate* is also a noun.

Here are a few questions you could ask to determine if you are arguing, debating or discussing: Am I open to learning? Am I trying to win? Am I listening or waiting to respond? Am I doing this for attention?

In my opinion, when learning about the people I am arguing/debating/discussing with is more important than "winning," I am **discussing**. "What if you're on opposite sides?" We can both be discussing if the other person's goal is to learn something new. Seeing the topic from someone else's point of view is open-mindedness, which leads to learning. However, I do not think that if someone has a different goal than me that necessarily changes what I am doing.

Debates are about respect, logic and level-headedness. When presenting facts in order to define where I stand, I am debating. Debates are more formal than arguments. So can we trust people to keep their feelings and emotions in check? Do debaters know that if they take a sharp left turn (perhaps by accident) and suddenly desire to win they are no longer debating?

When being right and convincing another person to change their mind involves a flared temper, I am arguing. Even if I am not mad, say passionate, I believe opinions and strong feelings quickly turns a debate into an argument.

Argumentative papers are written to convince the reader to believe what the author believes by the end of the essay. In the argument, evidence is needed to validate an opinion. Writers use credible sources for evidence as opposed to supplying their argument with raw feelings. A feeling can't necessarily be used as fact, and before writers argue, they should examine where they get their beliefs on a certain subject from, then research facts, only formulating a thesis once these steps

are taken. A crucial step, the introspection is what we are encouraging the reader to do as they digest our opinions.

Arguing, debating or discussing can get even murkier in different circumstances. Take the

Street (Outside of academic settings)

Discussions are between open-minded individuals trying to reach a conclusion. Since I am an academic type of guy, I wear glasses that slip off my nose, and when I find something interesting to learn about, I push them up. I argue, but I am always interested in learning—we have two ears and one mouth. Street arguments take knowledge from classrooms outside to the playground, and the best **arguments** come from topics that need to be debated or discussed. Have healthy arguments everywhere.

Argue: persuade someone to believe what you believe by giving reasons

Debate: talk from opposing sides in order to reach a conclusion

Discuss: bring up ideas and perspectives

I can't think of an advantage of seamlessly being able to weave in and out of arguing, debating and discussing because you should always keep your goal transparent.

I argue because I have many uniquely unpleasant opinions. Opinions need firm stances. Firm stances require the utilization of confrontational defense and careful offense. Set your traps and watch for your foe's. Be methodical and critical. Remember loose lips lead to ruin.

People back down from the fog of arguments for just about every reason. Some arguments are necessary. When they are, take the stance and move smart—eyes open, especially when the air is thick. Clear arguments move clouds. Never argue with loose feet or; the goal is to catch your foe draggin' in the open.

If your opponent has a bull\$h1t argument, don't scoop it up. If it's cap, don't tip your hat. Just because you are arguing on the street does not mean that you can now argue without evidence! Ask yourself if you can argue with people who ignore facts.

"Keep it real; you shouldn't use your feelings as facts."

This is an opinion. Here my technique in my argument is to present you with a sentiment after saying "keep it real" to encourage you to believe I know the truth. I'm arguing if you believe the opposite, you believe a lie and are not keeping it real.

Thesis: Feelings can be crushed, unlike facts, so don't use them as such.

As a square shooter, I get tempted to crush people's desire to lie on facts. It is satisfying

to me to hear the truth asphyxiate weak arguments that stand on lies.

"Research animal DNA; humans are wild animals with a conscience."

This is a black and white opinion supported with science. Although I believe my stance is solid, there are people who will argue humans are not animals with the intent to change my belief. Regardless, this is a weak argument because I am being vague about science. You can still demonstrate an understanding of how to make a tight thesis statement based on weak evidence. Not strong, but tight. A tight thesis, which demonstrates deep thought, allows you to hold firm while you inquire about where you get beliefs from.

Thesis: Humans are wild animals because we kill, fight and conquer, even though we know sometimes it is wrong and immoral.

What is the difference between living in America and living overseas?

This question is intended for a debate. That fact does not change if you begin to argue it. Notice how there is no connotation or hint at which is "better" in the bland question.

"Buddy, I need to figure out why the hell you eat salt and vinegar chips."

This is a discussion. My goal is to learn why Buddy eats salt and vinegar chips. Am I out of pocket? Is how I said it rude? I am still exploring my friend's taste in chips.

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Wilkerson qualifies for 2024 NCAA DIII National Championships in the Triple Jump

Sophomore sensation Jaxsen Wilkerson has officially qualified for the NCAA Division III Outdoor Track & Field National Championships in the Triple Jump, finishing the regular season 21st in the nation with a mark of 14.54m.

Wilkerson becomes the first Tornado to qualify for nationals since the school competed in the NAIA in the early 2000s, as he will now head to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina to participate in the NCAA DIII National Championships. The Triple Jump event is slated for Saturday, May 25 at 1 p.m. at Doug Shaw

Wilkerson, a native of Granite Falls, North Carolina, earned USA South Conference Outdoor Field Athlete of the Meet honors following a stellar individual performance at the 2024 USA South Conference Outdoor Track & Field Championships in April that included five total All-Conference selections, with two of each coming on the first and second teams.

Baseball falls short in conference championship series

ROCKY MOUNT, N.C. - An incredible run through the regular season and the 2024 USA South Conference Baseball Tournament came to an end for the Brevard College baseball team (22-19), as the Tornados fell to top-seed and nationally ranked No. 19 NC Wesleyan University (33-11), 17-2 in seven innings on May 11 at Bauer Field.

The defeat wraps up a successful season for the Tornados, who earned their first-ever postseason home wins in the NCAA era en route to the program's first USA South Championship series appearance. BC has eclipsed the 20-win mark in three consecutive seasons, which is also an NCAA-era first. Brevard's 14 home victories are its most since 2012 (19) as well.

NC Wesleyan came out swinging early and never looked back in its championship-clinching

15-run win on Saturday afternoon.

The Tornados got on the board in the bottom of the fourth inning when Colson Miller provided their only runs of the game on a two-run home run. That blast marked the ninth homer of Miller's 2024 season, setting a new NCAA-era record for single-season home runs at BC. Also, the big-fly was BC's 35th as a team, also setting a new NCAA-era single-season record.

In his final collegiate at-bat in the bottom of the seventh inning, senior outfielder Mykah Johnson roped a leadoff double into left field, capping off his Tornado baseball career in style.

Junior outfielder CP Pyle and junior third baseman Frankie Vasquez were honored with selections onto the USA South All-Tournament Team following their individual performances through the course of the five-game tournament run. Pyle, a first-year Tornado transfer from Salisbury, North Carolina, recorded hits in four out of the five Tourney games, including two doubles.

Vasquez, a third-year BC student-athlete from Pembroke Pines, Florida, logged five hits over the course of the tournament for BC, and was an All-Conference First Team performer.



BC student-athletes celebrated at 2023-24 BESPYs

The Department of Athletics hosted the 2023-24 "BESPYs," the college's annual athletic awards banquet on Thursday, April 25 at the Boshamer Gymnasium. The BESPYs were presented by the Brevard College Student Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC).

Several major awards were presented to standout student-athletes over the course of the evening in front of an audience of over 400 members of the Brevard College community.

The Ann Etters Award is given annually to the underclassman student-athlete who best displays excellence athletically, academically, and through dedicated service to the BC community. The 2023-24 Ann Etters Award was presented to Jadon Carnes, a rising junior men's basketball student-athlete.

The John McKissick Award, presented annually to the most outstanding football senior student-athlete both on and off the field, was awarded to graduate student Joc Pledger. The Chuck Dunbar Team Spirit Award was presented to Brady Penn, a graduating senior student broadcaster and football student-athlete who also served as an event MC for the evening. In addition, an award presentation took place for rising junior defensive lineman Robert Dorsey who won the NCAA Division III statistical crown for most forced fumbles in 2023.

Additional award winners included USA Cycling national champions Cole Punchard (Male Cyclist of the Year) and Nicole Bradbury (Female Cyclist of the Year), along with baseball student-athlete Blake Altschuler (Male Rookie of the Year). For the first time in BESPYs history, there was a tie for a major award as Jadyn Harlow of softball and Austin Huffman of women's soccer were each named Female Rookie of the Year.

The Brevard College Perfect Storm awards are given to the most outstanding overall Tornado student-athletes both in sport and in the classroom. The third annual David and Lynne Joyce Award was presented to graduate student Brooke Garland of women's tennis. The award is presented to the graduating senior student-athlete who displays superior performance in competition, in the classroom and in the community over an entire career at Brevard College.

The 2023-24 softball team captured the Tornado Cup, given to the team that accumulates the most points in the Tornado Cup Challenge with the components of Academic Excellence, Athletic Excellence, Personal Development, Community Service and Athletes Supporting Athletes. The BC volleyball team earned the Highest Team GPA with the highest cumulative grade point average

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SPORTS BC Athletics 2023-2024: A Recap

Volleyball

The BC Volleyball team won 10 matches, the most wins since 2017 en route to a trip to the USA South Tournament. Bailey Lance surpassed the 1,000-career dig mark and set a school record for career aces. Logan Priddy and Kaitlyn Pressley each eclipsed 1,000 career assists, while Pressley, Makenna Parkins, Caelyn Murphy and Jaxson Tumicki each were named Academic All-District.

The BC football team went 5-2 in the USA South Conference in a season that included a thrilling Homecoming win over Maryville to spark a fivegame win streak. A total of nine Tornados were honored with USA South weekly awards, while four players won D3Football.com Team of the week accolades and four more were named All-Conference performers.

In the classroom, a school-record four Tornados were named to the Hampshire Honor Society by the National Football Foundation and two more were named Academic All-District.

Cross Country

The BC's men's cross country team finished third and the women's team placed fourth at the USA South Championships to go along with a return trip to the NCAA Regional Championships. Dalton Hawley, Devon Brodmyer and Garrett Spangler were all named to All-Conference teams on the men's side, while Sandra Diaz-Martinez earned All-Conference honors for the women.

Cycling

The BC cycling team won five individual national titles, more than any other school and a secondplace overall finish at the USA Cycling Mountain Bike National Championships. Nicole Bradbury won national titles in the Individual Omnium and Dual Slalom, while Cole Puchard won national championships in Cross Country and Short Track.

Senior Cameron Mader won the national title in his final race as a collegiate in the Men's Downhill. The Nados then followed up with a second-place team finish and another individual national title for Cole Punchard at the Cyclocross national championships.

Women's Soccer

The BC Women's Soccer team posted a 13-5-3 record and finished as runner up in the USA South Conference tournament. BC was undefeated at home with an 8-0-2 record at Ives-Lemel Family Field. The defense and goalkeeping were superb as BC recorded a whopping 13 shutouts on the year.

Five Tornados earned USA South weekly awards and three Nados were named to the USA South's All-Tournament team, to go along with a schoolrecord six women's soccer student-athletes being named Academic All-District.

Men's Soccer

For the second straight year, the Tornados men's soccer team won the USA South Conference Championship to advance to the NCAA Division III national championship tournament.

The program has now secured three total championship trophies in the last four seasons and has become the first program in school history to ever appear in consecutive NCAA Tournaments. BC's Ryan Lynch was named USA South Player of the Year and MVP of the conference tournament. Five Nados were named to All-Conference teams, while four student-athletes were Academic All-District performers.

Women's Basketball

The Tornados women's basketball team won an NCAA-era program record 17 wins and went on to host a USA South Conference Tournament First Round game for the third straight year. In the first round of the conference tourney, BC defeated Greensboro 60-46 to advance to the semifinals for the second consecutive season. Josie Hester and Olivia Miller were both named to All-Conference teams, while Hester and Chyna Pouncey both earned Academic All-District honors.

Men's Basketball

The BC Men's Basketball team won 13 games and went 8-6 in the USA South including a hot streak of five wins in six games in January. The Tornados won a 104-98 thriller over Berea and defeated USA South Conference tournament participants Greensboro, NC Wesleyan, William Peace, and Pfeiffer en route to a trip to the USA South Tournament for the second straight year. Grad student Quincy Carter was named to the USA South Conference First Team, while Jadon Carnes was an Academic All-District performer.

Cheerleading

The Brevard College cheerleading team brought tremendous spirit and energy to NadoNation at football and basketball games all season long. The Tornados cheer program also competed in the 9Panel All-Star competition in Asheville.

Track & Field

In Track and Field, six different Tornados won USA South weekly awards including a record five awards in one week.

Jaxsen Wilkerson currently ranks inside the top 20 nationally in the triple jump at the NCAA DIII level, with nationals awaiting next weekend in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, Wilkerson earned Men's Field Athlete of the Meet honors at the 2024 USA South Conference Outdoor Championships, with teammates Kellun Triplett earning Men's Field Rookie of the Meet honors and Makayla Street garnering Women's Field Athlete of the Meet accolades. All told, BC racked up 17 total All-Conference performances at the championship meet.

The BC Softball team recorded a road win at Agnes Scott, then delivered with a big doubleheader sweep versus Wesleyan in the home opener that included a Rookie of the Week honor for Jadvn Harlow. Brevard delivered more solid results at the Fast Pitch Dreams Tournament in Myrtle Beach with wins over Gwynedd Mercy, Thiel College and the University of Maine Farmington.

Men's Lacrosse

The Men's Lacrosse team defeated Wilmington, then dominated Warren Wilson 26-6 to capture the Battle of the Blue Ridge trophy for the third straight year. Parker Corbett broke the single-game record for assists and points, while going over the 100 career goals mark. Jacob Gravely and Michael Peters eclipsed the 100 grounds balls plateau with Gravely breaking the program record for caused turnovers in a single season and career. Freshman Tyler Cameron also broke the program record for single-season ground balls.

Women's Lacrosse

The BC Women's Lacrosse team recorded eight overall wins, including a five-game win streak, and five victories in conference play. Emily Denaga set new school records in career goals and points while going over the plateau of 300 career draw controls. Xan Hill and Paige Kneubuhler each eclipsed the 100 career points mark.

BC's defense and goalkeeping were superb as well, holding opponents to single-digit goal totals in five different games. BC WLAX appeared in the postseason for the second time in a row, the first time that has happened in the program's history. Denaga, Hill, and Grace Blanton were all selected to the USA South All-Conference Third Team.

Baseball

The BC baseball team finished the regular season in second place in the USA South Conference, clinching the opportunity to host postseason play for the first time in the NCAA era. The Tornados advanced to the USA South Conference Championship Series for the first time ever after a pair of postseason victories vs. Pfeiffer at Gil Coan Field.

Over the course of the regular season, BC earned its first-ever nationally-ranked series win by taking two-of-three at No. 19 NC Wesleyan in March, and the Tornados slugged their way to some NCAA-era records with Colson Miller breaking the single-season HR mark of the NCAA era (nine), Cale Oehler setting the career NCAA-era homer mark with 15, and the Tornados as a team hitting a new NCAA-era record of 35 home runs. Frankie Vasquez earned All-Conference First Team honors alongside a spot on the USA South All-Tournament Team, with Oehler garnering All-Conference Second Team honors.

Tennis

The BC Men's and Women's tennis teams both clinched spots in the USA South Conference Tournament. The Women's team advanced to the tournament for the third straight season, while the men's team defeated Southern Virginia in thrilling fashion to earn the team's first postseason win since 2010.

Hayden LeBlanc burst onto the scene with four USA South Conference Rookie of the Week honors and one Player of the Week in 2024, while Hannah Hersch and Madison Bowen earned an USA South Doubles Team of the Week honor. Hersh, Brooke Garland, and Sophie Trantham earned CSC Academic All-District honors on the women's side, with Horton garnering the honor on the men's side.
