

`It's not as bad as it looks, it just looks bad'

Wildfires in region raise concerns about air quality, evacuation plans

Over the past week, Brevard and other towns near the North Carolina border have been in a state of anxiety regarding the recent wildfires; go-bags have been packed and plans have been made in case of an evacuation order. But how worried does Brevard College need to be? A town hall meeting was held Thursday, March 27 in Tornado Alley addressing these concerns.

According to AirNow on Thursday, March 27, the closest wildfire to Brevard College is the Table Rock fires that are approximately 10 miles away, just across the North and South Carolina border. The fire started Saturday, March 22 and is currently still active. It has since consumed around 4,600 cumulative acres.

Many Brevard residents have had concerns about the smoke that has permeated the air. In a town hall meeting held in Tornado Alley, officials clarified that the smoke coming into Brevard is not particularly harmful. The current haze is from burning trees and vegetation as opposed to buildings and structures. The smoke from man made structures have harsh chemicals in them that can be harmful to inhale. While the air is not as contaminated as it could be, it is still suggested that individuals with respiratory issues avoid prolonged time outdoors. Because of weather changes and the location of the fires, more smoke may be moving into the Brevard area in the next couple of days.

Many calls have been made to the fire department recently. These calls can be considered nuisance calls because of the high number of calls regarding smoke. "If you see flames, that's when you really need to start calling 911," Public Information Officer Adam Hughey said.

The actual fires surrounding Brevard are slow burning and are being contained as much as possible. According to Bryan Stroup, Chief Deputy, in the town hall meeting, "It's a slow burning

process. So it sounds close, but in fire weather that's actually a pretty good distance away." The fires have a very low chance of making it to campus.

The fires have been spreading quickly mainly due to the downed trees from Hurricane Helene and recent storms. The terrain also plays a hand in the spread of the fires. Flames will spread quickly up a mountain, but will not spread down unless aided by the wind.

While there may not be only fires in Brevard, the conditions are right for a fire to spread quickly. The largest concern for the area are these bad conditions. Any flame can start something, so Brevard residents and students should keep the burn ban in mind during this time.

There have been many rumors and worries that the Brevard area will have to evacuate. So

far, it is looking like an evacuation will not be necessary. In the event that an evacuation is required, Brevard College has an evacuation plan, and there are still several roads open that can be used to get out of the area. For those that need to travel in the next couple of days, officials recommend using the Waze app to best see which roads are closed. An additional note from the officials said that these roads that are closed are not because they are blocked by flames, it is because of the emergency vehicles that are stationed on those roads.

Being this close to wildfires is anxiety inducing, but precautions are being taken. Local and outside fire departments are doing all that they can to keep people safe and keep the fires contained.

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


Of all the classes she has taken at Brevard, Baumann said her favorites have been Connect-



BC cyclists take Fayetteville US Cup by storm

Nine BC cyclists competed with their respective teams at the US Pro Cup and Continental Cup in Fayetteville, Arkansas, from March 20 to 22, with standout performances from Senior Owen Clark, Junior Nicole Bradbury, and alumni Tyler Orschel, as well as a top-five finish by Freshman Ayana Gagne.

Other Brevard cyclists showed their grit and determination: Junior Mya Dixon, Sophomores Madeleine Pollock and Cade Pummill, and Freshmen Ned Broersma, Charlie Chastain, and Kevin Vereeke.

"The US Cup in Fayetteville was the season opener for me, so you can never really know what to expect. That's always both super intimidating but super exciting at the same time, knowing that anything can happen," Clark says.

There were three days of racing in total; Thursday was a UCI C1 cross-country olympic (XCO) race, Friday was a UCI C3 short track (XCC), and Saturday was a UCI Continental cross-country olympic race. XCO is a 90-minute effort, and XCC is a 20-minute effort.

The fields were extremely competitive; Olympians, world-cup racers, domestic pros, and hardworking amateurs all took to the start line in search of glory.

The racing was supposed to begin on Wednesday March 19, but due to high winds, the competition was postponed until Thursday, March 20. This meant that everyone was forced to push their body to the limits three days in a row, instead of having the typical recovery day.

"The races being pushed back were a bit of a blessing for me. I definitely prefer racing in good weather, so knowing that we had a nice, calm sunny day to race lowered the stress levels quite a bit," Bradbury says.

BC athletes came out charging in Thursday's XCO, where Clark placed third, and alumni Orschel took fifth place in the elite men's race. For the women, Gagne took fifth in the U23 women's race, and Bradbury placed in the top 10 in the elite women's race.

Friday saw the dusty and tactical short track, where all athletes were pushed to their limits. Clark took fourth in the elite men's field, and Bradbury finished seventh in the elite women's.

The final day of racing was the Continental Series, where the most points and money were on the line. BC cyclists rose to the occasion, with Clark rounding out his weekend with another podium in fourth place and alumni Orschel taking fifth.

Clark says, "I was able to race at the level I hoped for, making it a huge boost of confidence going to the first world cups of the year coming up quick."

On the U23 women's side, Bradbury rode to a strong 2nd. "I was really happy to have three of the best races I've had in years, and be in the mix with some girls who are competitive on the international stage," she says.
